



WILKES EXPRESS VIEWS IN LETTERS

Important Matters Brought to Public Attention By Interested Residents

Editor of Record:—Will you kindly publish this in your valuable paper, as it may interest some of your readers. I have read with interest, various articles in your paper, and also noted the controversies in the Water Board, and Board of Trade, over the proposed taking of water from Jackson's Pond, by the Linden Water Co., and they are very interesting. The city officials at present, as in the past, do not seem to realize what a serious question the water supply is, and may become in the near future. Had J. R. Farber, when Mayor, and the City Council not been against the Middlesex Water Co., would not have control of the Robin Hood Branch of the Rahway River, which rightfully belongs to Rahway, and would have given us a much purer, better supply, with less expense to purify. This, connected with our present system, would have given Rahway a supply for all time and enough to sell to pay all expenses of the department. This idea was lost because of the officials being asleep at their posts—however, that is past.

Jackson's Pond, as Mr Savage says, is a natural reservoir for holding thirty-five million gallons, and it should have been bought by the city long ago. A gentleman on the Water Board, told me they did not need it, as they could build a dam at the water works. They could not build a dam for what the whole of Jackson's Pond could be bought for, and if Rahway grows as it should in the near future, it must have a large supply and a reserve reservoir. But again the Water Board refused to buy of Mr. White, and they allow Mr. Savage to get an option on the pond from Mr. White, and apply to the Board of Conservation and Development, the permission to take water from same, subject of course to Rahway's prior rights. If this was granted, and possession is nine points of the law, Rahway would naturally suffer in time of drought.

As the aforesaid State Board will probably not grant the Linden Co. permission, and the option held by Mr. Savage expires on Jan. 1st, the City should at once secure same. If the Linden Co. wants, and can obtain water below the Rahway supply, no one could object in the least. Everyone knows why he has that option and if the Linden Water Co. had a hold upon the pond, he would not care what Rahway had, so long as Linden got theirs.

THE DANGEROUS SHORT CUT

DON'T BE A GLUTTON

Pennsylvania Railroad issues illustrated Calendar to Warn Public of the dangers of taking "short cuts" over railroads, playing on the tracks or using railroad right of way, bridges and trestles as highways. The Pennsylvania Railroad System has issued an illustrated calendar especially designed to appeal to young folks. The calendar is intended particularly for use in school rooms and will be used for that purpose throughout the cities, towns and country districts served by the Pennsylvania Lines, both east and west of Pittsburgh.

A picture at the top of the calendar shows a typical crowd of children, just out of school, hurrying across the tracks near the school yard. They are taking the "dangerous short cut," despite warning signs. They could walk to a nearby bridge which would mean safety, but that would require a few more steps. One boy is seen stumbling on the track in front of an approaching train. Another is indulging in the dangerous sport of "balancing on the rails." Beneath the picture is this legend:

"Every year more than 4,000 American boys, girls and grown folks who take such risks as these throw their lives away. Don't you be one of them."

On the first sheet of the calendar is printed this explanation of the purpose for which it is issued:

"The Pennsylvania Railroad System is doing all it is power to reduce the loss of life which results from trespassing on railroad tracks; yet on its lines alone, there is a man, woman or child killed, while trespassing, for nearly every day of the year.

"On the railroads of the United States as a whole, an average of fifteen people are killed each day while walking on the tracks, where they have no right to walk. This has been called the most needless waste of life in America. About an equal number of people are maimed daily from the same cause, many of them permanently.

"A large proportion of the killed and injured are children. The country cannot afford a loss of this sort."

The calendar starts with November, to cover the remaining weeks of 1914, and is complete for the year 1915. An extra sheet inserted before the opening of the new year urges these resolutions:

"I will do my part to end the dark record of railroad trespassing in this country."

"I will avoid the danger of using railroad tracks for highways and short cuts."

"I will stop, look and listen at railroad crossings."

"I will endeavor to persuade others from recklessly inviting danger."

"Every month of the calendar tells a brief lesson of the dangers and extent of trespassing on railroads, and of the efforts of the company to end it. One shows that in a single year 3,637 people were sent to jail and 2,428 were fined for trespassing on the Pennsylvania Railroad."

Four important warnings are:

"Don't steal rides, and don't jump on and off trains while they are moving. Thousands of boys and older people, too, have been killed—and maimed that way."

"Never go under or around the safety gates at a railroad crossing when they are down. There is no way to save people who won't take warning."

"A short cut across the tracks may save you a hundred steps—and cost you a leg or an arm or your life. Don't take this chance."

"Don't use railroad bridges and trestles for short cuts. You can never tell when a train may come, even if you think you know the regular ones."

WRAPPING TWINE FROM PAPER

Washington, November 27.—That wrapping twine which give thorough satisfaction can be made from paper has been demonstrated by experiments made by the Forest Products Laboratory at Madison, Wisconsin. Several hundred packages, each containing a medium-sized book, were wrapped and fastened with the lightest-weight paper twine and were mailed to various points throughout the United States. Reports show that practically every package was received in good order and that in no case was there any damage which could be charged as a fault of the twine.

In making twine the paper is cut into narrow strips which are then twisted tightly to form a cord. The strength of the twine depends upon the character of the paper used and the process of treatment. It is well adapted to a number of purposes, but the foresters say that as yet no satisfactory means has been found for protecting paper twine from the action of water and it should not be used where it will be exposed to moisture.

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LICH INTEREST IN DEFENSE PROGRAM

Preparedness Measures Being Considered By Congressional Committee and Patriotic Citizens

WEDNESDAY, Nov. 27.—People's interest and activity of the non-partisan and patriotic in the recent national election, sign of reaction or lethargy to be seen by those in Washington, who take their stand on the public issue.

and continue in these hours with the general sentiment of the land. More than ever before do the people now direct the work of Congress, and the masses of every nation that they are the spokesmen, not the instruments, of their constituents.

Already, the progressives have started a movement to have legislation adopted as a positive policy of one or the other of the great political parties, and steps for similar adoption of the women suffrage principle have been taken by the international women. Most determined of all the movements with definite objects in view, the the interests of national preparedness against war, who, however, work on a strictly non-partisan basis to build that a movement of such

immense import should not be confused with practical politics in any way.

The two hundred members on the preparedness program at present are to assure the provision of an appropriate committee to carry out the navy-building plan adopted in the last session of Congress, and to ensure the early passage of a measure for universal military training. And with these two movements George H. Clegg, chairman of the board of trustees of the American Defense Society, believes the people of the country are in sympathy.

In the general discussion of the plan for universal military training the fact has been disclosed that in none of its great wars have the forces of the United States been outnumbered by those of its opponents, but, on the contrary, always have been much heavier than the hostile ranks.

During the War of the Revolution it appears, the American forces employed numbered approximately 40,000 men, as compared with a total force of 110,000 British troops and Indians in the British service. But, the Americans were untrained and undisciplined and largely ignorant of the rudiments of military affairs.

Even greater contrast was shown in the War of 1812 in which the United States had under arms a total of 60,000 men against a total force, throughout the war, of 75,000 British soldiers and Indians—a proportion of almost eight to one. Yet, in that entire war the United States did not win a decisive action, but rather met a long series of military disasters, the battle of the Plains and the battle of Lundy's Lane being merely "fines."

The capital of the nation was defended by 4,000 raw, untrained and undisciplined troops who on August 24, 1814, were driven from the field by only 1,500 trained British soldiers.

Finally, in the Civil War, 1,670,000 men passed through the Union armies compared with a total of 600,000 to 1,000,000 men in the Confederate forces.

These are facts which the advocates of preparedness feel many people do not know, and it is to this probably pardonable ignorance that a pro-pacifist sentiment is due. Many people have yet to learn that universal training is in no way a step toward militarism, but is actually the very best preventive of militarism that could be devised, and that men trained to arms are far less likely to be "food for the enemy" than raw recruits led to the field in droves in an effort to make up in numbers what they lack in military knowledge and effectiveness.

A Public Service Statement

To the People of New Jersey:

During the recent campaign a number of the candidates for office, including one of the candidates for Governor, one of the candidates for Mayor of Newark, and one of the candidates for the State Senate in Essex County, went up and down their respective constituencies seeking political capital for themselves by attacking this corporation.

They did not confine their malicious attacks to their public speeches, but the newspapers of the State were filled with paid advertisements of the same general character, either inserted or promoted by them. One of the chief bases of their attack was the allegation that this corporation maintains at Trenton, during the legislative season, a pernicious and corrupt lobby, for the purpose of improperly influencing legislation. This corporation does no such thing.

As long as conditions remain as they have existed in the past and as they are at present, the corporation will, if I can control it, send its officers to Trenton to represent it in a legitimate, straightforward way in the light of day.

The corporation is seldom interested in any affirmative legislation. When it is so interested it goes about the matter in precisely the same manner that any other company or individual would do under similar conditions, but every year over ten per cent. of the bills introduced in both houses of the Legislature are bills, which, intentionally or otherwise, directly affect the property and rights of Public Service. There are tax bills; there are rate bills; there are confiscation bills and there are strike bills, in all more than one hundred every year.

Those of us chargeable with the responsibility for the management of the affairs of this corporation, would, indeed, be recreant to our trust if we did not exercise the American right of free speech in reference thereto. It is a matter of every-day experience for delegations of the public, of all kinds to go to Trenton to exercise their influence in favor of, or in opposition to, this or that measure pending before the Legislature. It is frequently an act of patriotic service for one thus to participate in legislative councils. According to our traducers when we seek, in the same manner, to protect ourselves from the character of legislation above referred to, it is not an exercise of right, but an act of scandalous lobbying.

When the theorists, the demagogues and the fakers cease attacking the corporation in the manner above indicated, we shall be only too glad to be relieved of the vexatious burden of self-protection.

This corporation is honestly trying to carry on a great work of upbuilding development throughout this state, from which it is only seeking a reasonable return commensurate with the risks and efforts involved. This, I believe, the people of the state are rapidly realizing to be the truth. At all events it would not seem as if the making of Public Service the feature of their campaigns had been particularly successful, as two of the three gentlemen above referred to were overwhelmingly defeated for the offices they sought, and the third, while elected, ran many thousand votes behind his ticket. Throughout the country this corporation remained altogether silent on the subject.

In all fairness, is it not about time that this kind of noise stopped, and that politicians who seek to ride into office through attacks on this corporation, should at least make statement of fact and not reiterate false accusations?
