a few months ago? Who will ever forget it? For months the city actually suffered. In taste, smell, and color our water brought to mind the stories travelers write and tell, of the Ganges of India, in which a million Hindus daily bathe, with this difference: The Hindus believe the waters of the Ganges cleanses from sin, while our water left a stain on everything it touched Did complaints have any effect on the Rahway Water Board? No! Not even a promise of better conditions did any one receive and it remained for a private body—the Board of Trade to take the matter in hand. It startedan investigation and employed an expert, Geo-A. Johnson, Sanitary Engineer, of New York. His report is not very complimentary to the Rahway Water Board, and teems with instances of carelessness at the water-works. Among many other things it was found that a chemical company at Springfield was draining into the Mr. Arthur R. Wendell was present when wheelbarrow loads of dead fish were taken from the stream. And this condition had been permitted to exist for months! Forty-eight hours after the report the water cleared. Why?

Rahway has had a water plant for nearly forty years. During that time the bonded indebtedness has constantly increased until now it is at the limit, \$250,000. The gross receipts have been absorbed and the city is armually called upon to place in the tax budget a sum for the retirement of these bonds, while the bonded indebtedness increases. Municipal and private plants in other cities, during the same period have been able to pay the interest on their bonded indebtedness, pay dividends to their stockholders and show a surplus. Our plant has gone steadily back. Why?

Hindsight seems to be a feature of our Water Board's Administration, and if the Tax Payer desires verification of this statement a stroll to the Water Works will convince him. There he will find where some of his good " money went to construct the ruins of what was to be a sedimentation plant that was found to be inadequate after experts had viewed it. And there should be no excuse for this.

ing the present Water Board with inactivity. 5. As to the bonded indebtedness referred to in the advertisement In 1871 the City of Rahway issued \$185,000.00 worth of bonds for the original construction of a water plant without providing for any sinking fund to meet the bonds

For this the present Board was not accountable. In 1892 these bonds were adjusted, and new ones were issued in their place for the same amount, but still without any provision for a sinking fund. In 1906 a \$35,000.00 bond issue was made by the Water Board for the purpose of erecting and constructing the present filtration plant. At the time of this issue adequate provision was made for a sinking fund to liquidate the bonds when they matured. This sinking fund low amounts to approximately \$11,000.00. In 1914 serial bonds were issued up to \$30,000.00. These have since been reduced by \$10,000.00, two or more bonds having been paid off during each year, as the City's best interests dictated The fact that the bonds constituting this \$30,000,00 issue were signed and approved by Mr. Fyffe, the then Democratic Mayor and by Mr. Kirchensner, the then Democratic City Treasurer -both men who stand high in the respect of the citizens Rahway-is ample proof that the issue was necessary and advisable and so considered by the Democrats as well as by

the Republicans in authority.

Commencing 1910 some money has been appropriated each year by the City for the purpose of accumulating a sinking fund with which to pay at maturity the bonds issued prior to 1906, for which (without fault of the Water Board) previous provision had been made. This is absolutely the only item in the tax budget which is in any way whatever chargeable to the Water Board and is of course a result

absolutely beyond its control. 6. The advertisement further states that municipal andprivate plants in other cities during the same period have been able to pay interest on their indebtedness, dividends to their stockholders and show a surplus. As to municipal plants, this is absolutely untrue. As to private plants, it may be and probably is since they are operated for profit and have additional sources of income-over those of the Rahway Water

7. It is not the aim of the Water Board to show a cash surplus. Its object has been to so conduct affairs that the citizens of Ruhway could be furnished with water at as low a rate as possible. The income from the rates now in effect are slightly more than sufficient to pay running expenses. The surplus is used for extension of mains installation of hydrants, and other improvements. The City of Rahway obtains its water free. The estimate of the State Public Utility Commission of the cost of furnishing this water to the City of Rahway is \$10,000.00 per year. There is no other municipality in the State which furnishes water at a cheaper rate than that in effect in Rahway. If the Democrats intend to show a surplus, should they come into control of the Water Board, it means that they intend to increase the water rates, i.e. the cost to the consumer.

8. The sedimentation plant is still needed and used at times when the water is muddy and unsettled. It necessarily follows that some money must be spent in its construction and repair to keep it in proper condition. 9. The Water Board has not become a one-man body.

With very rare exceptions the action of the Water Board on all important matters has been unanimous. This statement can be verified by Mr. Fyffe, Democratic Candidate for Mayor, who was a member of the Water Board for four years at a time when the Board consisted of the same persons who now compose the same.
