#### The "Maine" Duplex Ice Grate

The "MAINE" Duplex grate illustrated here is in form a Duplex rack, constituting at once the top of the germ-proof provision chamber and bottom of the ice reserve. Heavy rust-proof metal in deep, open corrugations—the upper bars convex, alternating and overlapping the deep, concave bars below, each convex bar separate from the others, solidly riveted and soldered to the massive rim at either end. In like manner are the concave bars separate and complete in themselves, but also reinforced by a second set of smaller concave

The ice rests on the strong convex bars at the top, and the waste water from the melting ice, carrying with it all sediment, gases, vapors, and other impurities to be thrown off, drops into the concave bars below. The grate is tipped slightly, causing the water to run quickly to back of the grate, where at the end of each bar, through the heavy rim, is a slot through which the water falls into a deep trough.

The small concave bars catch any condensation from bottom of the large concave bars in which the cold water from the ice is moving.

At the center of the trough is an opening which allows the water and its burden to fail into the receiver of the waste pipe. The pressure seals the automatic trap in the receiver, forcing the water down the pipe and closing top of the pipe air-tight. The water and its impurities pass down and out; no opportunity for gases or vapor to rise up by the trap and into the

The automatic trap is at the top of the waste pipe, and not at the bottom. The old fallacy of exposing the ice chamber to a pipe full of gases, dirt, and other dangerous impurities thrown into the pipe in the process of purifying and drying the air for circulation is eliminated. 


