

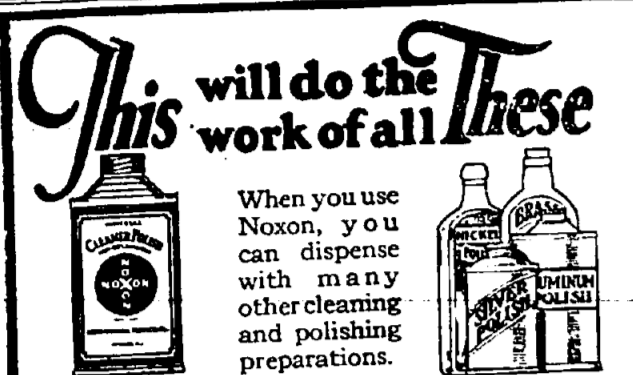

Resolution offered by Commissioner Farrell provided for the construction of the Essex street assessment, payable in two installments, the first due Oct. 1.

Upon resolution of Commissioner Farrell a deposit of \$25 was made with Board of Freeholders in connection with opening Madison Hill road for driving street water main.

Regarding street department work Mr. Farrell said that the report of City Engineer Levi prior covered activities. Mr. Farrell's report of labor charges for week ending June 17 was: repairs, \$82.80; resurfacing curb in East Hazelwood avenue, \$39; cleaning gutters, \$85.28; laying two-inch water pipe in street, \$11.00; repaving street, \$22; resurfacing road, \$79.21; park maintenance, \$11; repainting catch basins, \$23.50; correcting road, \$12; time on real estate transfers, \$25.91; general work in street department, \$10.25; total, \$72.48.

Numerous resolutions dealing with financial matters were offered by City Commissioners. Resolutions providing for the following: Borrowing of \$5,000 from Rahway Trust Company to meet interest demands and other expenses in water account; warrant payments of \$2,500 for interest due on water bonds to State Treasurer; Read for interest on school bonds; payment of \$2,500 on motor bus engine, having a balance of \$24.80 to be paid; payment of \$72.50 on school site, fire engine and other items; payment of \$20.00 on various sewer and shade tree notes; tax refunds of \$5.42 to Mrs. Catherine Schelinger; \$1 to C. R. Tins, a fire; \$1 to Hirsky Laska, amount overpaid; 91 cents to Don King; 30 cents to W. A. Hanson; tax cuts to H. B. Adams; 90 cents to Serafino Donato; \$1 to Mrs. Elizabeth Lawrence; 30 cents to P. V. Dobbin; 30 cents to Model Homes Land Company; \$67.41 to G. C. Woodruff for duplicated payment; \$1.98 to William B. Wright on overpayments. These resolutions cleared up all tax accounts for 1919.

Bills amounting to \$10,550.22 were ordered paid, including \$5,508.84 in city departments and \$5,041.38 in water department.

Officials present were: Mayor David H. Tremblay, City Commissioner John Farrell and Harry Simmons, City Clerk Charles H. Lambert, City Treasurer William H. Wright, City Engineer Levi Price, Assessor Peter Gillman, Sanitary Officer Fred M. Williams and Fire Chief Charles T. Post.

The "MAINE" Duplex grate illustrated here is in form a Duplex rack, constituting at once the top of the germ-proof provision chamber and bottom of the ice reserve. Heavy rust-proof metal in deep, open corrugations—the upper bars convex, alternating and overlapping the deep, concave bars below, each convex bar separate from the others, solidly riveted and soldered to the massive rim at either end. In like manner are the concave bars separate and complete in themselves, but also reinforced by a second set of smaller concave bars.

The ice rests on the strong convex bars at the top, and the waste water from the melting ice, carrying with it all sediment, gases, vapors, and other impurities to be thrown off, drops into the concave bars below. The grate is tipped slightly, causing the water to run quickly to back of the grate, where at the end of each bar, through the heavy rim, is a slot through which the water falls into a deep trough.

The automatic trap is at the top of the waste pipe, and not at the bottom. The old fallacy of exposing the ice chamber to a pipe full of gases, dirt, and other dangerous impurities thrown into the pipe in the process of purifying and driving the air for circulation is eliminated.
