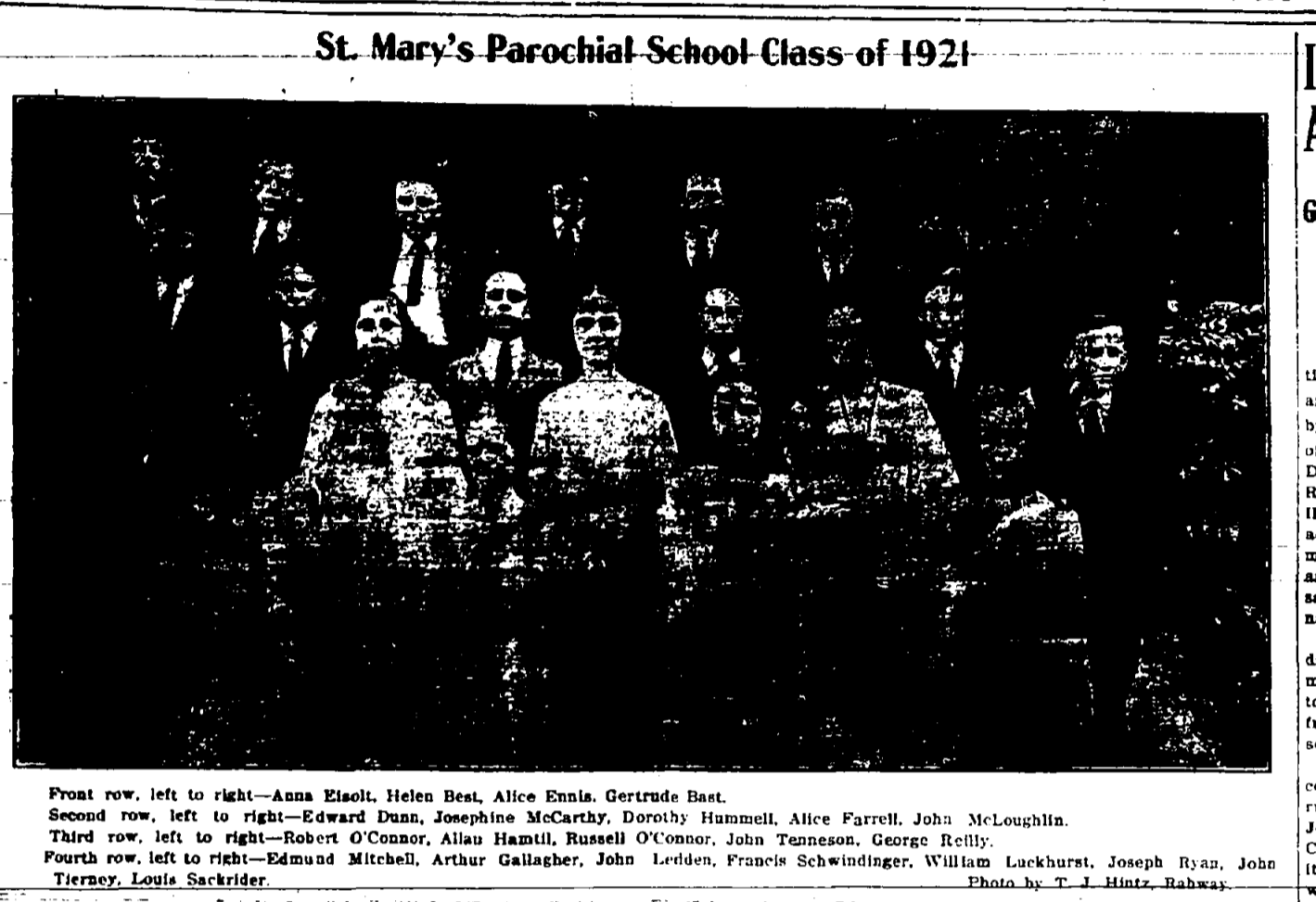

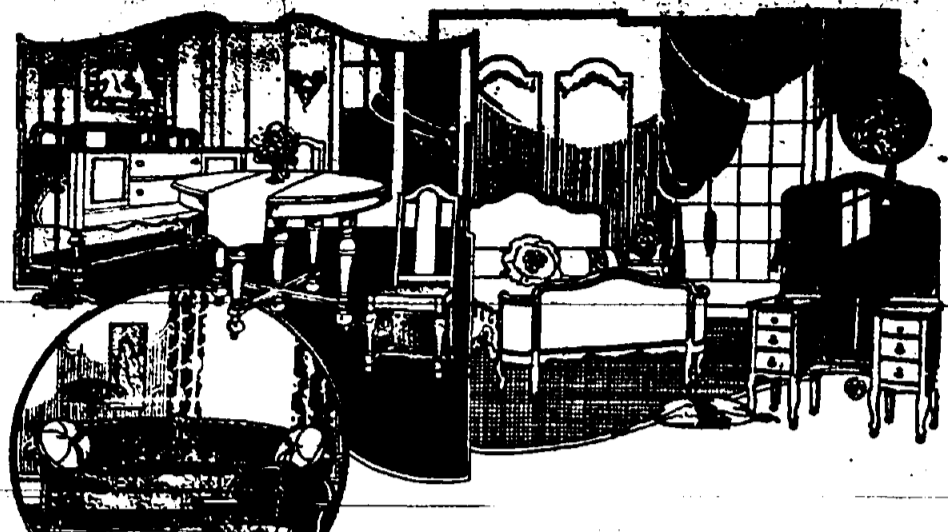
SUNDAY SCHOOL MEETING

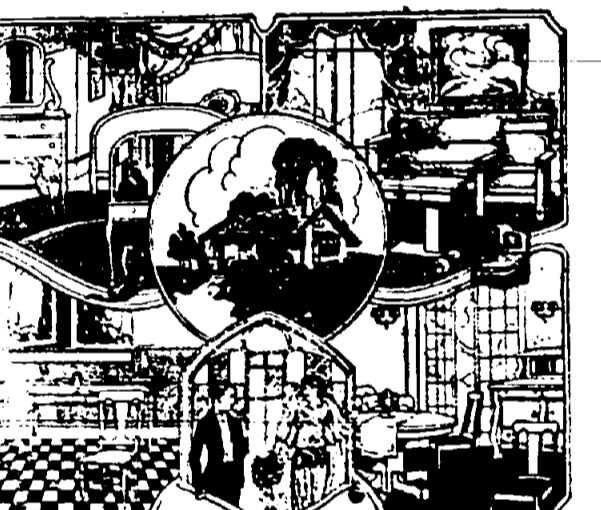

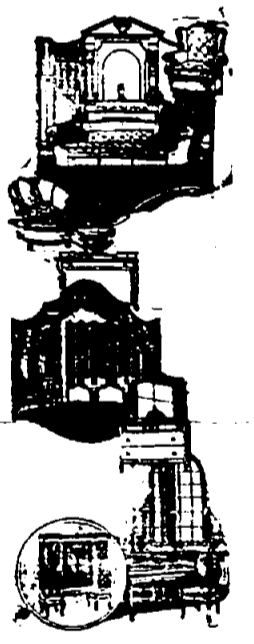

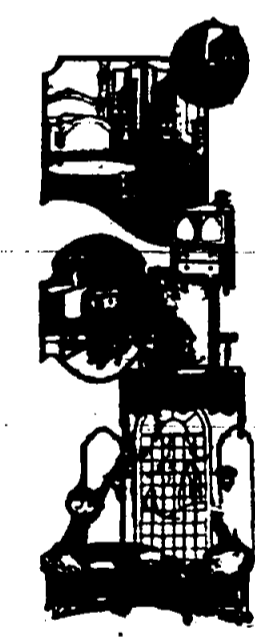
