(Continued From Page One) Primary election clerk William A. Bourdon, Democrat, unopposed, received the usual vote of his party.

The Rahway vote for Assembly and county clerk candidates appears in a table published in another column.

The school district of the Second Ward had the highest vote of any district in the city and was therefore the first district to have its election completed.

The total registered vote this year was 5,000 as compared with 4,700 last year, an increase of 200.

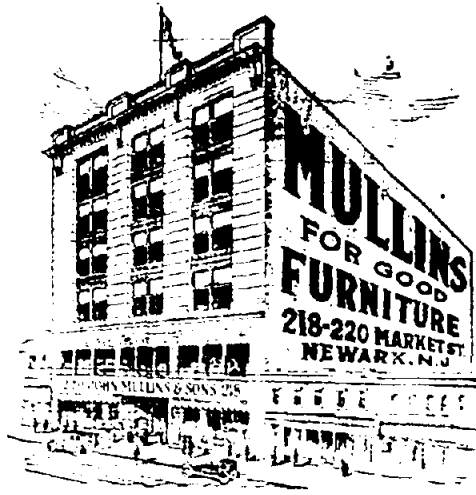
