Jan. 1—War between Russia and Finland began over allied Finnish aid to Karelian rebels.

UNION GETS \$84,575 STATE ROAD FUNDS

Motor vehicle funds for 1922 total \$84,575 which will be given out to the various counties by the State Highway Commission at its meeting next week. The amount is the receipt of the motor vehicle department and is used for the maintenance of New Jersey highways. Requests for the sum of \$3,000 were submitted to the county offices of the state. Included in the amounts to the counties were Union, \$8,157.50; Atlantic, \$8,129.75; Essex, \$10,500; Morris, \$10,500; Middlesex, \$14,575; Monmouth, \$19,625; Passaic, \$16,250; Bergen, \$14,500; Hudson, \$13,000; Cape May, \$1,000; Gloucester, \$10,000; Burlington, \$23,650; Gloucester, \$7,000; Hunterdon, \$7,150; Mercer, \$11,205; Morris, \$12,100; Ocean, \$11,825; Salem, \$1,000; Sussex, \$1,000; Union, \$1,000; Warren, \$663.50.
