

FINE FIGHT WAGED ON TUBERCULOSIS

Union County League at Annual Meeting Shows Work of Past Year

The regular January meeting of the Board of Directors of the Union County Tuberculosis League was given over to hearing reports of the past year's work.

The Treasurer's report showed a balance of \$1,275.15 on hand December 31, 1932.

The Case Supervisor's report revealed the work done by the five field workers and showed some very interesting facts. The League now has employed on its staff eight people, consisting of the Executive Secretary, Case Supervisor, five Field Workers and a stenographer. Three of the field workers are assigned to the City of Elizabeth, while the other two cover the county outside of the city.

In addition to the two regular weekly clinics held every Monday and Thursday at the Elizabeth General Hospital and the regular examinations of the children in the Freebairn Clinic at School No. 15, in Elizabeth, "clerk" were held in the Japheth, St. John's, 1 clinic at the Alhambra and 45 clinics in 13 municipalities in the county including Rock Hill, Cranford, Scotch Plains, Springfield, Clark Township, Mount Pleasant, Kenilworth, Berkeley Heights, New Providence, Summit, Westfield and Rahway.

In Elizabeth the League conducted a total of 121 clinics at which 1,055 persons were examined; 407 new cases were enrolled, 94 of which were carried on the records for further examination on account of contact with active cases or on account of recent suspicious symptoms. At the county clinics 826 persons were examined and 247 people from the county attended the Elizabeth clinics.

The summary shows that 531 new cases were enrolled, 171 patients were admitted to Sanatoria and 75 others were sent to the Preventorium at

Union-Middlesex Body Celebrates Opening of Fine Terrill Road Building

The Association celebrated the opening of their new building on Terrill road, Clark Township, Thursday evening, January 25. The principal feature of the building was a supper for which one hundred and fifty were seated. A table was set up across the stage at which the officials of the association and speakers of the evening were seated, and across the main floor, which is furnished with three continuous tables, were placed the tables were beautifully decorated with flowers and candles.
