CLAIMS VICTIM**

Levi Place Found Frozen to

Death In Field Across City. Line In Clark Township.

Following right on the heels of the heels of the unusually balmy weather of last month, the wily wave

Levi Place, 52 years old, of 245½ West Grand street, having been found frozen to death in a field known as the 'carnival grounds' in Clark Township, just across the Rahway city line. Workmen crossing the field found the body yesterday morning.

An ambulance from the Hospital was summoned and Place's body was rushed to that institution. Dr. B. W. Houghland, after an examination, said the man had been dead several hours. He said Place had frozen to death. Place had been in Clark Township Sunday night and to thought to have started to walk home. Owing to the snowstorm, it is

thought probable that he could not fast his hearings in walking across the uneven field and he may have fallen and been knocked unconscious, the Deep sentence could freeing him before he could regain consciousness. Place who was unmarried, has recently been living with the Edward Stacy family at the West Grand street and dress. He is survived by two brothers.
