On 192 Places in United States its Relief Operations' Cost \$737,603.

One hundred and ninety-two places in the United States had disaster relief operations during the year 1923, and the Red Cross established a new record in the number of places served. He is able to cheaply, unlimitedly produce synthetic petroleum, he claims, and it is good for all kinds of uses.

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## SLAUGHTER DUCKS BY THE THOUSANDS

### Mexicans Use Batteries of Guns on Fowl

Mexico City—Mexican sportsmen, in their fight to preserve the country's diminishing flocks of ducks from predators, are using as high as 2,000 birds at a single discharge of their "armadas," or great batteries of shotguns, which fire 1024 rounds per minute, to meet hunting regulations by the fish and game bureau of the department of agriculture. The Mexican law forbids wild ducks by means of "armadas," or greater batteries of shotguns, which fire over 2000 birds at a single discharge.

While only two weeks ago fowling was permitted, it is considered a minimum restriction, as the fowl will return to the same place after the Mexican hunters make the firing of more than two "armadas" a week ineffective.
