Sound Public Economy Demand

By the President of the United States

Through the State Department he is fully advised of international conditions and relations, what they are now and what they are likely to be a few years in the future. Through other departments he is fully advised of domestic conditions and needs.

He is in a position and qualified by determination, information, to appraise the situation as a whole, and not from the restricted viewpoint of the head of only one department or branch.

Whether the appropriation for the Army, Navy or Shipping Board should be \$100,000,000, \$100,000,000 or any other amount is a matter the President is best qualified to determine.

The budget Bureau has helped the President in the use of his powers and to do so will continue to do so.

It is on others and reports that they are prepared to test these reductions and to wage opposition to them in Congress.

It is the duty of the President to see that the people are not misled by the propaganda of the people who are in opposition to them.

President Coolidge, following a now established custom, has designated the week of October 4 as Fire Prevention week, a week when all citizens shall take steps to avoid some of the stupendous waste incidents of the year.

Through the fire, the loss of property is estimated at \$100,000,000 a year, most of which was available by proper prevention.

President Coolidge in his proclamation says that this waste results from conditions which justify a sense of shame and horror and which are a disgrace to the Nation.

Before, and during the war, we heard much of the doctrine of "victory" under which the German people lived, and doubtless many got the impression that it was of course practical, practically everything that was necessary to win the war.

It is certain, however, that the people were subjected to a regimentation which had been taught to believe was and which was in fact a preparation for the war.

By today our laws are mostly—certainly very largely—inhibitions. The aim of legislation seems to be to tell the people what they may or may not do.

We are subject to all sorts of regulations at the hands of government, state or national. Although there must be a state, if the Constitution stands in the way, as at one time a campaign to amend the Constitution to increase the power of government to regulate interstate commerce was carried on.

We seem to have taken for our model Peter the Great, who used to regulate the length of men's beards, and whose "care" for his people was to "reform" and "improve" them.

Gas Cuts Cost of Autos

Absolute control of heat through the use of gas, in melting metals employed in the manufacture of automobiles, has brought about large economies in production.

Thousands of spare parts, formerly rough cast and then machined to size, are now turned out by automatic dies with a degree of accuracy impossible under the old process.

This saves the waste due to rejection of imperfect casting and saves the expense of machining to size.

Wardens to Report Water Pollution

State fish and game wardens will co-operate with the newly created Sanitary and Economic Water Commission in preparing a complete survey of the condition of the waters of New Jersey as respects pollution.

Every stream and lake, bay and ocean shore will be inspected and information concerning every source and character of pollution will be available when the survey is finished, for the use of the commission in its water-pollution campaign.

The program of Sanitary and Economic Water Commission promises results. This record, created by the Legislature at the request of many interests, including municipal water supply officials, seashore resort owners and chambers of commerce, agriculturists and sportsmen, who contended that some official body should be entrusted with the task of preventing the despoiling of public waters, with its menace to life and property interests and the destruction of fish life.

This new commission is composed of representatives of these state departments and boards directed indirectly interested in the subject of water pollution.

Commissioner George C. Warren, Jr., of Summit, who represents the Fish and Game Commission on the new board, has promised the assistance of the New Jersey warden in making the primary survey of water conditions. Every warden has been furnished with a questionnaire, answers to which will cover conditions in his county in detail.
