Orders Dinner for Two, Kills Self Before Guests

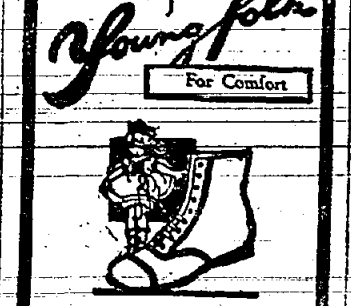

Five Cities to Spend Billion

Chicago—The modern kings of democracy, the American people, spend for public improvements more than any other people in the world.

Louis XIV of France spent a sum estimated at \$100,000,000 on Versailles. Five cities have announced plans for public improvements in the next decade alone, which total about \$1,000,000,000; or one dollar for every ten cents of the French king. Eleven of these cities have revealed of spending \$25,000,000 on such improvements in the next decade; and the regular running expenses of city governments amount to \$100,000,000.

The five cities with definitely announced improvement plans for the coming decade are: Detroit, \$30,000,000; Chicago, \$25,000,000; Cleveland and Kansas City, \$20,000,000 each; St. Louis, \$15,000,000. Other cities are spending great sums, but available data were not yet in adequate detail.

Detroit's ten-year plan contemplates the use of \$100,000,000 for the coming decade. The school system is to be improved, \$10,000,000 in new schools and equipment. Reflecting the fact that Detroit is estimated at \$100,000,000, and average disposal, \$25,000,000.

Chicago's third of a billion includes the system of a park 15 miles long and 10 miles wide, the city of Chicago is estimated at \$100,000,000, and average disposal, \$25,000,000.
