



"That no member of the common council shall be appointed to or competent to hold any office, the salary or emoluments of which are paid from the city treasury, or be DIRECTLY or INDIRECTLY INTERESTED IN ANY CON-TRACT, WORK, OR BUSINESS, or in the SALE OF ANY ARTICLE, THE EXPENSE, PRICE, OR-CONSIDERATION-OF-WHICH-IS-PAID-FROM SAID CITY TREASURY, or become security for any officer appointed by said council, or for any contractor under the city government, under penalty of five hundred dollars for each offense, to be recoverable by suit in the name of the "treasurer of the City of Rahway," and the said penalties, when received, shall be paid into the city treasury. * * **
