





Preserve Rahway's Water Supply

The Newark Evening News in an Editorial on Wednesday of this Week Says:

That unless the unrestricted taxing power of the District Commissions proposed in the Second Amendment to be voted upon Tuesday is curbed by the enactment of specific laws, there are elements of danger attached to the passage of the Second Amendment. Commissions under this Second Amendment have the power to incur indebtedness for Public Works and Improvements, which indebtedness shall be the debt of the District.
