The coal grates are not disturbed. You can build a coal or wood fire at any time without interfering one bit with the burner. You can burn coal or garbage with the burner operating simultaneously, if you wish. No bricking whatsoever is required. It is not necessary to remove the ash-pit door, grates, etc., and coment the burner in, as others do. The Summerheat may be lifted from the feed door, a duplicate door placed on the heater, and everything would be exactly as before installation, though it is not at all necessary to touch the burner in building a coal or wood fire:
