Municipal Necessities

Convinced that a small mid-western city should pay him \$245.20 for damages done to his car in driving over the holes and bumps on one of the main thoroughfares, a motorist has presented a bill for that amount to the city council. The remarkable bill, locally in view of road conditions hereabouts, is that Rahway hasn't been subjected to the same attempt by automobile owners. By heretofore efforts on the part of members of City Council and disinterested property owners working in conjunction, this city has performed wonders while the past two years in transforming miles of neglected streets into thoroughfares over which traveling is accomplished with ease and satisfaction. We have seen the progress of an unusual ambitious street improvement program, and the necessary hard surfacing is by no means finished, nor will it be for months and even years to come.

Before and since considerable street has been made upon our city's rising tax, and the probabilities of a possible reduction in the rate. While we cannot get back of the fact that the cost of recent city improvements has added to the "poor man's burden," yet when we take air ambushed view of the forward strides in streets, water and schools, with other municipal improvements, could we hardly expect to see the city's tax rate increase, any other outcome. There are numbers who would have us believe that we are faced beyond reason, in fact, if we listen carefully, the conclusion one might reach is that we are spending more money for municipal operation than we are saving. It is well to distinguish between actual taxes and partial payments made for wealth-creating public improvements. In looking at the actual uncollected figures of expenditures, it takes no unusual imagination to determine that money must be spent, property of citizens, in order to give.

This motorist, for instance, believes he has a tangible grievance against his home town. The city government has neglected to provide him and his fellow citizens with a smooth roadway. Through this neglect, the taxpayers are losing money because of the high cost of running their cars.

One, shooting out at the National Capital, has brought about a substantial reduction in the need for national tax reduction should not be confused with the local problems confronting states, cities and counties. The local community is more directly charged with providing secure treatment, schools, water, sewerage, public playgrounds and the like. Rahway people of today are not only demanding up-to-the-minute comfort such as electric washing machines, vacuum cleaners and gas ranges for the home, but they are asking for the latest and most efficient machinery for operating the city. This means in effect that the standard of living has been raised to unheard-of heights; that the equipment purchased by the city in the form of schools and so on is a distinct part of this higher standard. But even in the face of quickened interest in living properly, the expenditures themselves show that the cost of conducting the business of the community is nothing to worry about at all. When an individual or organization declares with horror that a municipality or a state is spending for improvements nearly twice as much as in 1913, no mention is made of the fact that the purchasing power of the dollar has been reduced in the interim; that wages have virtually doubled since the purchase of normal pre-war period.

Rahway's municipal expenditures have grown actually, but an investigation might indicate that in a great measure, the increase has not only been justified, but inevitable to meet twentieth century needs. The street expenditures, for instance, with nearly 2,500 automobiles owned by Rahwayans, really grow that such expenditures are a necessity and a good investment. Then with the abetting of "Old Dobbin" and the provision of the successful new traffic machinery, the control, public parking spaces, wider and stronger streets, new bridges and many additional safety measures. The modernizing of city departments is another necessary item in the list. This does not of course imply that in modernizing, a surplus of manpower is to be laid off, and the city forced to carry unnecessary payroll. If intelligent application of new and needed ideas are in force, it means increased efficiency and increased production to show for increase of office payroll.

A survey of the country shows that new issues of municipal bonds have been recently decreasing since 1924, cities have caught up with the improvements delayed during the war period and are rapidly getting back on a program of conservative expansion. Another evidence that civic debts are not extravagant is the high rating and ready sale of municipal bonds. Not subject to all of the Federal and state taxes, municipal securities are in continual and increasing demand. Interest rates show how highly experienced bankers class municipal securities and the sound financial policy of the municipality which issues them.

While high grade public utilities must finance their improvements with bonds paying five to six per cent, cities are able to borrow money at four per cent or less. Conservative bankers hold that to loan as the indebtedness is kept within ten per cent of the total assessment, spreading the cost of public improvement over several years at a low rate of interest, is sound policy.

Man the Initiator

In his humblest, when the deeds of angels and archangels are brought to his attention, man has been wont to call himself a worm of the dust, but now a French scientist, Louis Clavel, declares man is but an initiator of the lower-forms of animal-life, and that many of his most boasted inventions have been used by the lower for ages. To make the humiliation of man complete, the scientist says he is but a poor initiator at that, and the inventions of insects and animals are always more perfect and worked out with more detail than those of man.

Even the camouflage of the war is as old as the hills; among the lower animals, he says, and the grasshopper has used a terrific tube from time immemorial to plant its eggs low in the ground. Even the patient fastener, only invented by man about forty years ago, has been used by the cutworm to button its entire skin on over-also there has been a cutworm, while the felling, the anchor, the rail, the groove and the art of dovetailing have been always used by the lower animals.

Weekday Religious Training

The Rahway Federation of Churches at its recent meeting took up the question of weekday religious training for the youth of our city, after a bit of discussion the matter was laid over, pending the securing of further data as to the success of the same idea in other places, also the approximate cost for a plan suitable for this city, the method of securing good teachers, and the attitude of the parents.

There is no denying the fact that the youth of today, and the older folk as well, would not be really fatigued or possibly their intellect, while it may be restful, it is an incursion upon its properties, yet it should be to assimilate an additional amount of spiritual assistance. While in the hum of the busy environment these rapidly succeeding days bring us, and like the public school curriculum, we may seem to be overcrowded, yet if instruction could be persuaded into a little, we think it would be possible to squeeze into our lives and the lives of our children additional religious instruction and training.

This idea of weekday religious training is not a new one in Rahway. Some years ago considerable discussion upon the subject was indulged in, but little of a concrete nature accomplished. At that time a plan was under advancement involving the public school children certain hours during the school week. Opposition was met, as we remember, upon several lines, and finally the matter dropped. It might be opportune just at this time to publish the following quotation from the press of the American Lutheran League:

"The introduction of religious instruction in the secular state schools would be the first step towards a state religion and an established state church. That would mean a repudiation of the fundamental idea contained in Americanism, and of its past history. If men do not want a state religion and an established state church, must cease criticizing the secular state school for its lack of religion."

Side by side, State and Church in our country must work for the education of our youth and the upbuilding of an intelligent citizenship. Each must work in its distinct sphere and do all it can. Neither should create prejudice for the other, but each should render the work of the other easier and more efficient in every proper way. That is the correct American attitude in this matter, and that has been the wise American standpoint for generations.

The Rahway Federation of Churches will receive suggestions without a doubt from many sources to help them in their desire to make possible the religious instruction of the youth. The hope is that a more commendable one, and deserves the hearty support of parents, particularly as well as the citizens in general, doesn't require a very powerful magnifying glass to convince us that the youth of today are in need of moral and spiritual uplift, and any additional means with this as an objective should be welcomed.

Interest Rates and Building Rentals

As an explanation of the lower interest rates at which loans for buildings are at present obtainable, as compared with the rates of a few years ago, the argument has been put forward that one reason for the decline in interest is lessened profits in real estate. In this connection it is further stated that building operations throughout the United States have practically everywhere caught up with the demand, with the result that the days of excessive high rentals and extraordinary profits made by some builders and real estate operators are past. It is concluded, therefore, that the effective demand for buildings, that is believed that real estate operations will not hold out the promise of such large profits as in recent years, and that the real estate operators cannot afford such high interest rates as in the past were cheerfully paid.

As against this view of a prospect that the steady march upward of rentals for realty has changed to stabilization on present levels, it is claimed by others, that there is no necessary relation between the return on capital invested in buildings and the rates at which money is loaned for productive industry or commerce, and it is asserted that even though interest rates should be still lower, there need be no decline in building rentals. It is pointed out that there has been practically no reduction in the cost of building materials, or in the wages of labor in the building trades, so that it is not likely that the "replacement value" of existing dwellings or business structures will be substantially altered for some time to come. As seen from this viewpoint there is no reason for anticipating lower profit from realty enterprises.

Forecasting the future course of interest rates and business profits has become a popular game, and the community is to the weather or the state of the peach crop, says the "Christian Science Monitor." That an era of substantially lower rates on borrowed money is here, not alone for the United States but for all the industrial nations, is plainly evident by the course of bond prices. Yet there would seem to be no reason why this fact should alarm anyone. With capital abundant, and the owners seeking profitable investments, there will be opportunities for the efficient and enterprising to engage in various lines of industrial activity; that it was wisely planned and managed should aid in maintaining prosperity.

Investment Trusts

The sudden rapid multiplication of investment trusts in New Jersey inspires the investors' protective committee of Newark Chamber of Commerce to issue a word of caution. It urges prospective investors of stock in these companies to base their decisions to buy rather upon the known integrity and ability of the officers and directors of the company rather than upon the promises of lucrative returns.

This is sound advice and it would seem incumbent upon every investment trust to give wide publicity to the names of its officers and directors. It is not enough these days to know that the founders of the trust are men of integrity and ability. What does it interest us to know that those who were responsible for the birth of the older banks of Rahway were of exceptional character and dependability, if they are no longer connected with these same financial institutions. Their former connection is no assurance to their depositors. It is the integrity and strength of the banks' personnel of today that counts. Therefore, when a new investment trust is to be assured that in the event of happenings that might remove these men from the control of the corporation, would still be safe hands. Stockholders have a right to know not only who are the men in charge of their property, but also how their money is invested.

Too many investment trusts are in the nature of "blind pools" and the public is invited to shut its eyes and jump in. That there are hundreds ready to do this has been proved in the Ponzi case as well as in many others. New Jersey wants none of this kind. Auto Personal Tax
(From Newark News)

Demand for the repeal of the Franchise tax of this year's exempting automobiles from personal taxes, continues to be voiced by officials of municipalities. It has been costing us dearly, as the Chief Justice said, we are in favor of measures which will save the State heavy loss in revenue under the exemption act is wiped out, but not all of them.

The reason for these exceptions is that the auto personal tax was not imposed in all municipalities. Some taxing officials—stated favorites—allowed motor vehicle owners to escape the levy. The result was unequal taxation, and that cannot be justified.

If the tax is to be reimposed by law, and it ought to be, it should be done in such a way that the burden on owners of motor machines should be imposed on all alike. The assessors' duty is to make the tax as uniform as possible. Every discrimination in the past has been an unfair levy on those compelled to pay. With such a guarantee, the repeal of the Franchise tax would be equitable and there should be no hesitation on the part of the Legislature to wipe out the act.
