Darls, first woman chief of an Indian tribe, now i. the seventy-five-year-old "guide, pfilosopher and friend" of \$1,00 Seminole tribesmen, whom she ruled for two brief periods in 1922. She frequently appears in the District court here as an interpreter in litigation involving the oil lands of the Seminoles.
