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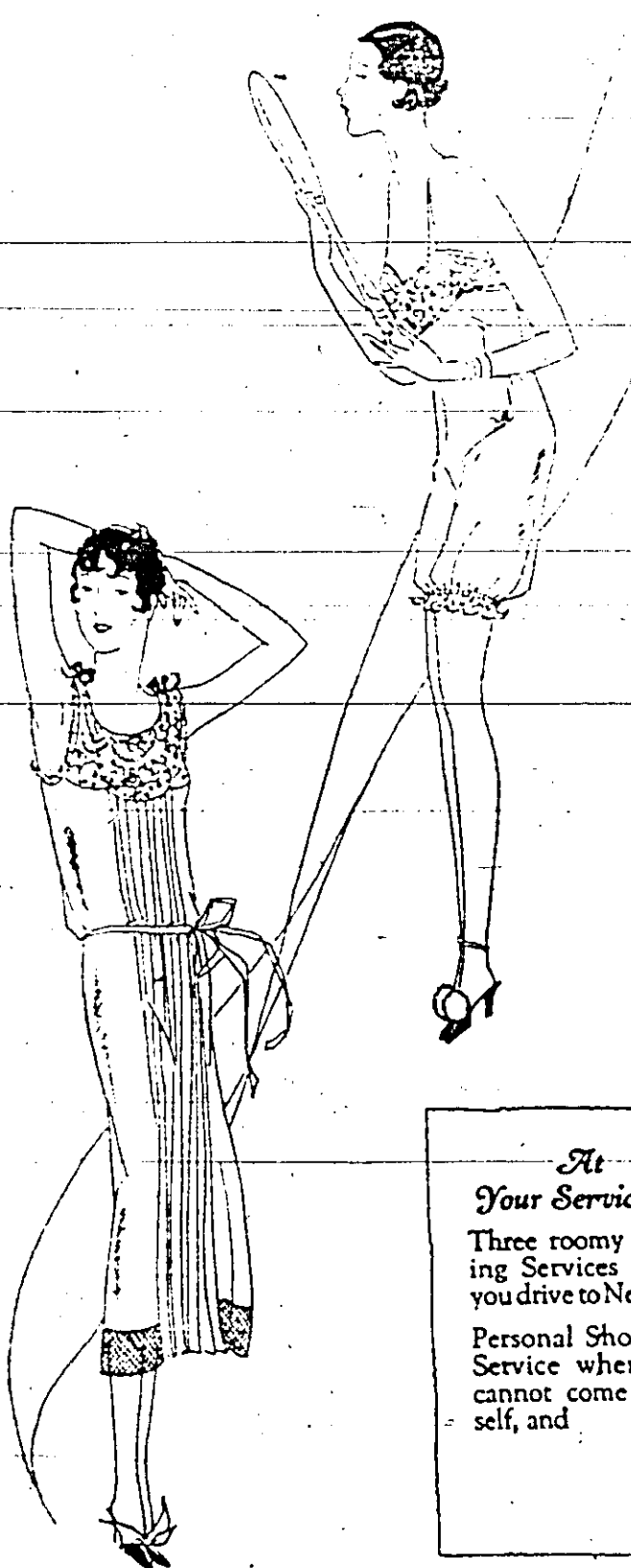

## PREVENT DIPHTHERIA, HEALTH BOARD URGES

Recommends Use of Toxin-  
Antitoxin

"Is your child protected?" asks the Rahway Board of Health. "Each year in New Jersey 5,000 cases of diphtheria are reported and about 500 persons die from this disease."

"Children are most susceptible and especially children between the ages of 6 months and 5 years. Nearly all this illness and death is unnecessary, for diphtheria can be prevented."

"Through injections, a week's part of small quantities of toxin-antitoxin will produce immunity. When this protection is once established it lasts for many years and probably for life."

"The test and treatment are harmless, no matter how young the child. Talk with your doctor regarding this matter. Don't put it off. Act at once. Don't wait until your child is taken down with diphtheria, it may then be too late."

The recommendation of the health board that parents avail themselves of the benefits of toxin-antitoxin was made at the meeting held Friday night at which Health Officer Fred M. Williams was authorized to urge its use.

The Board of Education has recently authorized William F. Little, superintendent of schools, to make the treatment available to school children, with the consent of the parents, but it should be given primarily to children of preschool age, Williams believes.

This was the chief matter taken up by the board. The financial report of Secretary Williams showed that the board finished the year with all bills paid and a balance of twenty-six cents in their fund.

President Dr. George F. Olson was in charge of the meeting. Others present were: Health Commissioners Mrs. William F. Little, J. B. Thompson and Francis T. Holly and Health Officer Williams.

**Hunters, Anglers to Wear License Button**

As a mark of official identification for a licensed hunter or fisherman and as identification at night as a hunter, non-resident or alien, each New Jersey sportsman, beginning January 1, will wear a button bearing his name, number, class, license, which will be supplied by the State with all 1928 licenses, must be worn by him at all times while hunting or fishing. It will not supplant but will be in conjunction with the usual license card.

For resident hunters and fishermen the background of the new license button will be blue, for non-resident red and for alien fishing license, it will be yellow. In large type across the center of each button will be the license number corresponding with the number of the license.

The law provides that a hunter or fisherman must carry the license card as well as wear the button and that the two must correspond in number. Heavy penalty fines for failure of wearing a license button by any other person than him to whom it has been legally issued. As under the present law, the licensee must exhibit the card for inspection to any warden, deputy police officer or any other person requesting to see the same. Failure to exhibit a license card at any time while hunting or fishing, is a violation of the game law, and punishable as such.

The use of the license button, as adopted by New Jersey Legislature, already has proven highly satisfactory in other states. Its tendency is to have been to discourage hunting without license and general violations of the fish and game acts. The plan was endorsed by sportsmen's associations throughout the state before it became a state law.

**Winter Fish Fishing**

While the game fish season in New Jersey closed November 30, many hardy sportsmen were preparing for their mid-winter fishing carnival, which during the first twenty days of January, it will be permissible to sport that has gained in popularity during recent years. The January game fish season will be the first of New Jersey anglers to wear the new license button, that will be issued in conjunction with license cards, beginning January 1, 1928.

When fishing through the ice for pike, pickerel and pickerel, it is permissible to use up to ten lines. The daily bag limit for any one fisherman during this period, however, is ten each of pike or pickerel and ten each of pike or pickerel.

**Drunken Hunters' Penalty**

To limit the fields or woods at any time with a gun or firearms while intoxicated or under the influence of any intoxicating liquor or drugs is a serious violation of the game laws of New Jersey, punishable not only by heavy fine but by revocation of the hunting and fishing license of the violator. Many game clubs this year have taken action against the members who attempt the foolhardy venture of booze or drugs and gunpowder. Wardens and deputy wardens in this respect have been very strict and have been successful in their efforts.

After tea is served there will be a problem hour during which the youths will have an opportunity to talk over their individual problems and put up to Mr. Davis any questions they may care to ask.
