Blocks of stone or masses of concrete were set up, often carrying the letters "U. S. C. S." Few people knew just what the letters meant, or what the markers were for. For the past twenty years the survey has adopted a plan of putting a properly inscribed metal tablet into the stone or the concrete at each triangulation station.
