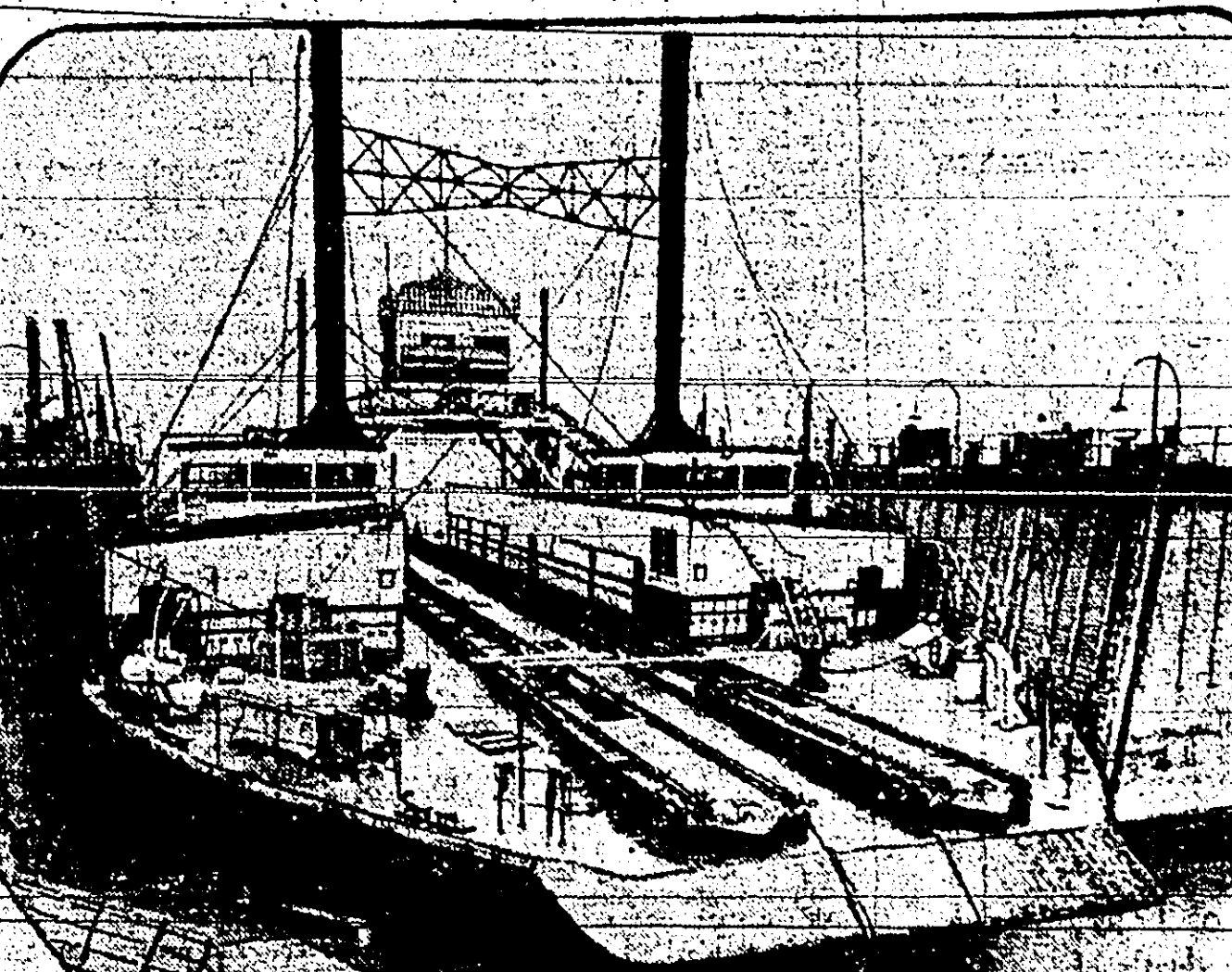

Commissioner Admits 'Spokesmen'

Quoting Holy Writ: "An honest man is good for the soul." So, at a meeting of the Police Committee of Newark held Monday night of this week, we are informed that the Chairman of the Police Committee Samuel D. Love publicly stated before the Police Committee that "there might be a number of spokesmen in the city, but it was virtually impossible to close them while certain conditions existed."

Condition No. 1.—That the inability of the department to get a conviction by the Grand Jury at the county seat, there seemed little opportunity of bringing the offenders to justice.

Condition No. 2.—Almost impossibility to obtain evidence.

Condition No. 3.—That the only remedy was for an upstaging type of man in Newark to get the evidence.

Taking the Police Commissioner literally, we must admit that the reason for the present state of affairs in various parts of our city, are very interesting, doubly so because by such statements, he confesses that the department of public safety is unable to cope with prevailing conditions. His weakness lies in that it is a citizen of the "upstaging type" could be secured to root out the evidence of the department would be much simplified.

In Tuesday's issue of the Record the tax budget for 1930 was published. Under the caption of "Protection to Person and Property" there appears an item of \$55,481.11 as salaries for police officers. This shows an increase over the preceding year of \$1,181.11.

Eighty-five thousand, four hundred and sixty-eight dollars and eleven cents are allocated for the salaries of the police officers. This is a very large sum of money for a city of Newark.

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The Ban On Fireworks

It is conceded that the application of the home rule principle to the sale and use of fireworks is a bad. Fireworks, by ordinance and use of the machinery of the Department of Public Safety, has for years tried to stem the tide of ever-increasing danger from high power explosives which regularly come into the market for Independence Day celebrations, with only partial success. Neighboring townships and boroughs refuse to cooperate, and this what-ever is accomplished locally is lost. There should be a state law prohibiting the sale and use of fireworks, excepting under supervision. The safety of our children demands such a law and common sense should prevail as a supporting inducement.

And Now the Groundhog
