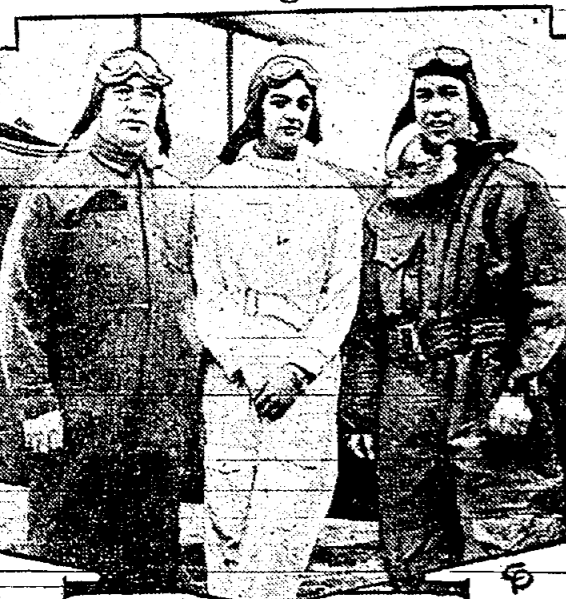
BUSINESS WOMEN DISCUSS CONCLAVE

Hearty Picnic Lunches Needn't Overtax Mother

How to prepare hearty picnics that will require no much work of mother and will at the same time satisfy the appetites of hungry picnickers is explained by Miss Marie Doorman, New Jersey extension service specialist in nutrition.

To facilitate the cooking of meats in a folding metal rack that can be placed over the fire and upon which the meats may be placed. For those who do not wish to build a fire, the use of a wide-mouthed tin can, into which water can be poured, which the meat can be carried, is recommended.

Having a camp fire offers many possibilities for variety in the meal. Miss Doorman explains that "camping" may be arranged at home, then made into this camp, and broiled over the open fire. Chop, steak, bacon and beef can be cooked in the same way. A thermos jar may be used for carrying succotash, baked string beans, carrots, peas or any other vegetable that may be desired.

"Club sandwiches are easily prepared at home," she says.
