Should Schools Be Closed? THERE will be no debate with the thought that the health of a child is more important than the education which fits him for life. That was one of the developments of the national conference on child welfare at the White House last spring and it-is-inaccordance with that principle that New Fork and many communities in Union and adjoining counties have deferred the open-

ing of schools. The continued prevalence of infantile paralysis which this summer took root in certain localities demanded that safe--ruard;-Rahway hus been comparatively free from this feared enemy of the child, although

two mild cases have been reported in this city to date, and fathers and mothers of growing boys and girls have every reason to give thanks to God. Because of this happy--condition of affairs, the authorities are preparing to open public and parochial schools in this city within the next two days.

Many parents challenge the wisdom of such a course and suggest that the resumption of classes be deferred for one or two weeks. The suggestion is offered even with the realization that there is no semblance of an epidemic in Rahway. However, infantile paralysis, which remains one of the communicable diseases to be combatted successfully by medical science, is a seasonable affliction which thrives in warm weather. There will be considerable hot weather during the fore part of this month and the grouping of children in schools presents at least some danger which should be avoided, they say.

Some communities-have-announced\_thepostponement of opening their schools. These include such cities as Elizabeth, Westfield, Roselle and Roselle Park, in our own county, Woodbridge and Perth Amboy in Middlesex County, twelve towns in Hudson County, as well as Morristown, Rutherford, East Rutherford, North Bergen, Bernardsville, West New York, Sterling, Millington, Clifton and Pas-But like Rahway, the schools in Linden, New Brunswick, South Amboy and hundreds of other New Jersey cities will begin this week according to schedule.

State Commissioner of Education Charles Elliott sent a communication to the Rahway Board of Eductaion-and those in all other New Jersey municipalities last week expressing the view that deferring the opening o schools is not necessary unless there is an epidemic of the disease in the city. Local health and school officials do not deem it necessary to cause a delay in the opening of the Rahway schools on Thursday because of the few cases in this city. Many believe that the children will be more immune from the discase by attending school, where they will be under strict medical surveillance, than they would playing about the streets. Should more cases develop here it would be an easy matter for the Board of Education and Board of Health to hold a meeting on short notice and take whatever action is deemed necessary. It might be well for the school health authorities and others interested in the welfere of the children, to closely watch the children entering school this week and send home immediately any who are not entirely healthy. This is indeed necessary as Secretary Wilbur, that inspiring disciple of child welfare, has said, "The health of our chil-\_ dren is worth any price."


