





Every Citizen's Problem RAHWAY would be a city without a civic problem if a joint meeting such as was held Wednesday noon when the members of the two local service clubs gathered to discus the unemployment situation here were hele temi-monthly or monthly. The Rotary and Kiwanas clubs are composed of practically all of Rahway's outstanding business and professional men who work in this city, and "vauld wield a terrific force for good in every endeavor if they handed together to push

Mayor Brooks was right when he stated unemployment was just as much the officials, "The Council can't carry the whole burden, as it needs the thought and telion of every resident of the city," he dethird. We contend that many persons who ve not been affected by unemployment have done little or have given little thought

to help their fellow men, while those who realize the graveness of the problem have been to affected that they are unable to render any assistance. If Rahway had more unsung heroes such as the example which the Mayor gave when he told how one landlord owning 21 houses, the largest rental of which is \$14, is \$1,633 behind in the collection o his rents, but has not evicted a single tenant for inability to pay his rent, the unemployment problem would not be as hopeless as it is now. It is too much to ask a single individ--tial-to make so great a sacrifice as this, and it is only just that some fund should be available to recompense this landford for some of his unpaid rent.

People ask why is a general fund needed to care for the unemployed when the Council makes frequent appropriations to this cause. This question was answered by Mayor Brooks when he explained that through a State statute the City of Rahway is able to contribute up to \$20,000 to aid the jobless, but this money can only be spent for public improvements. Money is needed to buy food and clothing for these unfortunate people who are without the necessities of life due to no fault of their own.

One plan to raise funds for this purpos has been suggested and appears to be most failure of a few. altractive. This is through the placing of a ive-cent tax on all receipts of football and basketball games played by the high school and other athletic teams in the city. A similar tax is also being considered to be added to card party admissions, as Mayor Brooks stated at the meeting that it is conservatively estimated that at least 150 such parties will be held in Rahway during the coming fall and winter months. This idea is a splendid one, as any person who has sufficient money to pay 25 or 50 cents for a sporting event or card party should be willing to pay an additional five cents to help an unfortunate neighbor. It is about time that the public at large gave some serious thought to the unem-

ployed of Rahway. Little can be done by the proposed city unemployment committee unless they receive some suggestions and are -given the needed co-operation from the public at large. A deficit of \$2,235.53 for a single month, added to the unpaid bills of the first seven months of the year, makes a deficit which would put many businesses into bankruptcy. A hospital must find some

way of carrying on despite such shabby support and the Board of Governors is taking the right step if it starts legal action to collect some of these long-overdue accounts. A financial condition of this kind is a serious state of affairs and may show some lack of modern business methods at the local institution. Most hospitals make it a rule that the bill against a patient is paid weekly, while the person is in the hospital, with the entire fee paid when the patient leaves the building. In cases of long illness or charity cases this might be impossible, but the burden of the payment should be placed on the patient or relatives and the payments made despite the hardship which might be placed on the family. This viewpoint may appear hard-hearted, but a hospital is operated for the benefit of a community and not individuals. If attention is given a few who fail to-pay their legitimate debts and through such action cause the hospital to curtail its work due to lack of funds, the hospital will

cease to be a community servant, as it will be unable to care for the masses because of the Another problem which needs solution is why a hospital, so modernly equipped as the Rahway Memorial Hospital, should fail to receive the support of all those who need medical attention. By this we mean the receiving of all the medical and maternity cases in Rahway and vicinity. Vital statistics of the city show that a large percentage of the births of Rahway children take place in Elizabeth hospitals. It is not known whether the mothers of these children requested to go out of town or whether they were influenced. in other ways, but we believe that if the Rahway Memorial Hospital received all local maternity patients and all others who need hospital attention and go to hospitals in other cities, the institution would have a great many more patients than the 54 ad-






