Jobs, Not Doles, In Rahway -TOBS instead of doles should be the order in Rahway was the thought left by Mayor Brooks with the members of the two local service clubs at the meeting to discuss un-

employment last Wednesday. "We must - handle this problem carefully and avoid such things as a dole system. I am absolutely opposed to any kind of a dole system for this system has already done more harm than can ever be corrected in municipalities where It has been tried and I don't want Rahway to make the same mistake," was his declaration at the meeting. The chief executive told how the city

was aiding the jobless through municipal improvements. This means that for every dolar spent in public relief it ought to get 80 cents in labor on public improvements. Allthe physically able unemployed men in the city, paradoxically speaking, should be put to work on projects that have accumulated over a period of years, projects that have not required the purchase of more material than the city has on hand or can acquire easily out of funds regularly budgeted to the various city departments.

The finding of jobs in Rahway should be an easy matter for, as have all cities, here we have shelved numerous projects in years segone by largely because of lack of funds. The chief item of expense connected with most of these projects was labor. But since the supply of labor is all too plentiful and the city is faced with the task of providing food and clothing for an unusually large "number, the time is ideal to beautify and improve the city, both to the benefit of the city; and the unemployed.

Out in Grand Rapids. Mich., is a method in operation since December, 1929, that has been so successful in eliminating the finandital dole that now only about 3 percent of the cases receive direct relief. But this direct relief goes only to families without an able-bodied bread-winner or to families too large for the part time efforts of the father to support.

Every able-bodied unemployed man in Grand Rapids who is in need of assistance - is working under a system which enables him to get along satisfactorily without losing his self-respect. These men are creating a new park, widening and extending streets, building new sidewalks, rounding off street corners for the convenience and safety of motorists, laying water mains and sewer lines, wielding axes for the city wood pile, filling in city lots, painting city buildings, and a hundred and one other things which vari-

ous city officials have on their books. Already these men have razed the buildings on the site for the new municipal auditorium on which many unemployed will soon be at work. A fine swimming pool in a city park has also been constructed, whose utility demonstrates the soundness of the Grand Rapids Men being given jobs by the city receive

their compensation almost entirely in scrip. Scrip is merely paper money, good for trade only at the city's store. Workmen are paid at the rate of 40 cents an hour, but at the city store the prices of food stuff and clothing and other necessities are so low that he workman's salary goes a long way. The scrip plan was adopted largely for the reasonthat it simplified the transference of food and clothing to workmen and lessened the dan-
