Fire Prevention Begins At Home nificance his words would have in modern life when, many years ago, he wrote "From small fires comes oft no small mishap." A fire loss of approximately a half billion dollars in a single year is a tax on American progress that could by no stretch of the imagination be called a "small mishap" and certainly it kindles a lot of trouble. Of

this amount \$20,298,000 is the loss suffered in New Jersey because of fires. Rahway has been unusually fortunate in fire loss, due in a large-measure-to-the-propressiveness of Fire Chief Walter H. Ritzman; and his efficient department. But like every other city, Rahway has many fires due to carelessness and other causes which were preventable. In some European countries the owner of property where fire originates through carelessness is legally responsible for any damage done to the property of others. The principle behind the law is worth considering. It places the blame squarely where it belongs-on the individual whose carelessness or neglect is responsible for at least eight out of every ten fires. We will never reduce the fire loss until we

thoroughly understand that individual re sponsibility is the key to the entire problem. -This is Fire-Prevention-Week, a nationalinstitution whereby the citizens of the United States are urged to give some constructive thought in an effort to reduce the fire losses in America, as 75 per cent of these losses are preventable. Eight Rahway Schools Emptied In 91/2 Minutes Fire Drills Held By Ritzman I

All Schools Emptying the eight Rahway school buildings of 3.652 students in a total elapsed time of nine and one-half minutes was the record made in a series of fire orills conducted Tuesday by Fire.
