As was predicted in these columns last week, to final decision on the schol question was definitely placed in the hands of the Common Council following a conference or the matter by representatives of the Council and Board of Education with Walter R. Darby, state commissioner of municipal accounts. The meeting revealed that if the city appropriates \$178,000 as its share in the trunk sewer pact, and the \$388,000 needed for the school, Rahway's municipal debt limit would be placed in jeopardy. One or the other

must be sacrificed, which shall it be? This city is almost forced to furnish its share of the cost of the sewer, provided the supplementary contract is satisfactory to Rahway, while the school is an absolute necessity if Rahway High School hopes to keep its standing as an approved secondary school. Another financial question is how much will be necessary for the proper care of our poor during the remaining months of the year when cold and hunger will stalk on the doorstep of many and the city must provide some means of support? It is probably the latter problem which is perplexing the members of the Finance Committee. The Council as a whole should assist the Finance Committee all it can in an effort to help solve these many problems.

At the present time the special sewer committee is of the opinion that Rahway is not getting a just deal in the sewer contract and has informed the Council that it should refrain from acting in the matter until certain discrepancies are cleared up. If this is the case why wouldn't it be possible to act on the school appropriation and hold up the sewer ordinance until after the first of the year. This would be financially possible and still leave a sizeable balance for any financial emergencies which may arise between now and January 1.

For the second time this year, Councilman A.C. Feakes, chairman of both the Poor and Alms Committee and the Building Committee, has asked the Council for an appropriation for the purchase of an inexpensive automobile for use by the building inspector and overseer of the poor. Such a request was made at the special meeting of the Council fast Thursday night: The suggestion was not received with any great enthusiasm by the Council because of the financial condition of the city. As was pointed out at the meeting the building inspectors in the past went around with the Fire Chief who, according to the city building code, is also obliged to inspect new buildings in order to see that they comply with the fire laws. The overseer of the poor is less fortunate and must use bicycle to make his calls in various sections of the city. These officials are probably justified in asking for an automobile but with the city finances such as they are at the present time the Council should investigate

every request for money carefully before approval is given. As the present year is fast ebbing away. it would probably be best for the Council to act on the school appropriation and leave all others in abeyance, if necessary, until the beginning of next year when money might be available for the sewer appropriation and items of lesser importance. Action on finonces is difficult in times like these and the public should be patient iw the Council shows that it is giving the matter careful considera-






