THE recent order placed by the Pennsylvania Railroad for the building of 60 powerful freight locomotives at a cost of \$2,-500,000 in itself does not mean that the executives of the railroad possess a cheerful outlook on the future. The locomotives are needed for the electrified portions of its system. But the fact that the railroad is proceeding with the electrification of its lines from New York to Washington is indicative that the officials do not think the country is going to the dogs.

The cost of this improvement, which incidently will be favorably felt here with the opening of the electrification project through Rahway on or before July 1, 1932, is many millions more than that which will be spentfor the freight engines. The railroads, not excluding the Pennsylvania, have been hit as hard as any other line of business and industrial organization by the






