Talked At Rotary

Committee Named To Plan Christmas Luncheon December 23

James E. Downes, general secretary of the North Jersey School League Association and professor of history of the Summit high school, spoke before the Rotary club Wednesday noon on the subject, "United States and Its Relation to the League of Nations." Inasmuch as Mr. Downes has made a careful study and is considered an authority on this subject, his address was particularly effective.

He does not believe that the League as now constituted is a perfect organization for international peace but believes it is the best that has as yet been offered to the nations of the world and the effectiveness of it is hindered greatly by the fact that the United States has not entered it.

Mr. Downes said that the United States is too powerful a nation to remain aloof from the League and that by its entrance it would aid greatly in helping to constitute a body that would function properly on international questions.

He cited at length the case of China and Japan in the Manchurian situation and strongly opposed to any international boycott, believing that it would not solve the situation.

He closed by saying that the League would be a long step toward insuring out the present internal difficulties in the League to make it an effective organization.



Public Service Reduces Its Electric Rates

Estimated Saving to Residence and General Lighting Customers Will Amount to Approximately \$600,000 a Year

Effective With Bills Rendered After January 1, 1932

A revised schedule of electric rates has been filed with the Board of Public Utility Commissioners. This is the first time since 1922 that Public Service has reduced the cost of electric service to customers, with a resultant saving to them of many millions of dollars.

The new rates will result in a saving to residence and general lighting customers of approximately \$600,000 a year.

The new rates will become effective with bills rendered after January 1, 1932.

These new rates divide the present second block of 30 kilowatt hours into steps of 20 kilowatt hours and 10 kilowatt hours, with a reduction in the latter from 8c to 7c per kilowatt hour. This will reduce the cost to users of small quantities of electricity.

Residence Rate

Under the new residence rate customers will be charged nine cents per kilowatt hour for the first 20 kilowatt hours; eight cents per kilowatt hour for the next 10 kilowatt hours; and seven cents per kilowatt hour for the next 10 kilowatt hours. For all in excess of 40 kilowatt hours per month, the rate will be six cents per kilowatt hour.

This new rate differs from the old inasmuch as the customer obtains the advantage of a lower rate after the first 20 kilowatt hours.

A further modification of the rate provides for a reduction from eight cents to seven cents per kilowatt hour in the case of three kilowatt hours or less in excess of ten cents in any residence.

The crankshaft, with four counterweights, forged integrally, weighs 33 pounds, an increase of 5 pounds over last year. Lubrication to the crankshaft and camshaft bearings, and the valve stem is positive pressure this year, instead of splash feed as formerly. Improvements in timing valve opening and compression-ratio contribute materially to the 20 per cent economy in power and to quicker acceleration.

The sum-total of changes is a distinctive addition to its class, but a "big car" in no sense of the word. From the substantial comment of those who have seen it, it is expected to prove a world record-breaker in the class of cars of its size.
