## Baked Apples

For baking select large, red, firm tart or highly flavored apples. Pare them half way down from the stem and core and place in a pan which can be closely covered. Pour over them a mixture of water to which has been added a third the bulk of sugar. For six apples use a half cup sugar and a cup and a half of water. When the apples are peeled and quartered they are ready to be baked. When the apples are baked, cover them closely and bake them in a slow oven until tender yet firm and unbroken. At this point remove the cover and fill the cavity of each

apple with one teaspoon of sugar, sprinkle the pared portion with sugar, and place the pan at the top of a very hot oven for a few minutes until the sugar melts and coats the apples a delicate golden brown.

When cool, serve with plain whipped cream or a mixture slightly browned in the oven. Cinnamon, nutmeg or raisins may fill the cavity in the apples and butter added, if they are not flavored.
