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### Great Britain Will Default

London, June 13 (US)—Great Britain will default on her \$75,000,000 war debt installment due Thursday in the event that the latest word of President Roosevelt, received last night, rejects Britain's offer of a small "token" or goodwill payment on account, according to the London press today.

The British cabinet meets today to make its final decision on its policy regarding payment.

### Expect British Debt Offer

Washington, June 13 (US)—Administration officials said a formal war debt offer is expected today from Great Britain which will probably take the form of a partial payment of the \$75,000,000 due June 15.

Although President Roosevelt has maintained complete silence on his attitude regarding war debts, there was a well-grounded belief that partial payment will be accepted.

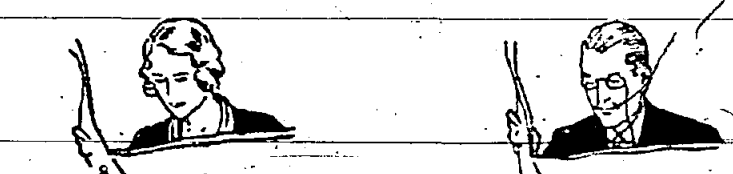
