





Rahway 90 Years Ago-From The Rahway Republican-Aug. 27, 1842 Fires in Rahway are beginning to be considered so much in the light of a mere matter of course, that we have almost to aplogise to our readers for the lack of interest they are doomed to feel in (what some indeed might deem) our village became brilliantly illuminated for the eighth time, within the brief space of five months, with a fire alike mysterious in its origin and ruinous in its results. We allude to the extensive dyeing and paint works belonging to A. & G. Frantz Brothers, situated in Leesville, Lower Ra way. The loss-is estimated by the proprietors at \$33,000 while only \$20,000 insurance was carried. This is the second dveing and printing establishment, in this place, that has been destroyed by fire within the last few months. 


