





The result of the congress decision, according to reliable diplomatic authorities, means a reign of wholesale murder and terrorism as exemplified by a machine gun "massacre" in Havina at flusk last night in which between 40 and 50 persons were killed and two hundred wounded when police fired on a milling crowd rejoicing over a premature report that Machado had quit.
