In commenting on the suggestion, The Herald-News offers to go along wholeheartedly with the plan if it could understand just-how-the-armed forces of the United States could be used to advantage in our fight against King Crime. There is but one answer to the question of how we are to answer the challenge that crime has thrown at us use the only implements we Americans know of in time of war-our army, navy and marines, as we commented last Tuesday. King Crime is waging a terrific war over our unprotesting bodies and we must answer with war. There is but one method-the esident must-issue a ceclaration-of-warmust throw the entire force of the government behind the declaration, just as was done

when Uncle Sam joined hands with Britain and her allies during the World war. With a formal declaration of war, our army navy and marines will be sent to the battlefront there to battle King Crime just as they battled King Wilhelm in 1917 and 1918. In this war the battlefront will be every large city and their environs in the nation. Under the law, which has always been monymous with America, every indicted criminal has the right to a trial-only this time-it-will-not-be-in-the-regular-routine-of our courts, but will be by court martial. We will not be hampered by petty politicians who, hand in hand with gangdom, have found ways of defeating justice and freeing the indicted. We will have every gaugster standing trial as prisoners of war-and speedy justice will be found. The laws of the army court martial will be followed and the stumbling blocks built up in our courts will be eliminated. If no other single benefit is thereby derived ve will save millions of dollars annually
