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
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Hubbell and Crowder to Pitch World-Series Opener Today

New Jersey Republican Women Demand Party Recognition

Trenton, Oct. 6—Recognition in party councils through selection of women candidates and on policies was demanded by the Republican women of New Jersey at a meeting here yesterday afternoon at which an association of women was formed. The association includes members of the county committee and the state committee with Mrs. Elizabeth C. B. Vergo, of Camden, as chairman.

Non-partisan regulation of the liquor traffic in view of the expected repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment was urged in a resolution adopted at the meeting.

The women also endorsed passage of an act limiting the tax rate by law and a system of control "that will permit a community to spend only a fixed amount."
