There would be no objection to the elevation at the Rahway point because there ar

no businesses along the route of either thor oughfare. In fact the residents of Rahway would welcome such an elevated street and the sooner the state authorities realize the need for such an improvement in this city the sooner accidents will cease at this point This is a project which the Common Counc and the Rahway Safety Council should strive for until the state accedes to the request and eliminates Rahway's "death corner."

Mr. Hedges who was practically the same age as Mr. Jones, was another man who had been known for his good work for community betterment but his passing did not come as so great a shock as he had been in delicate health for some weeks. How high the Colonia man ranked in his profession was indicated by the New York press last Wednesday when every newspaper, the conservative organs as well as the tabloids, all gave him the leading obituary notice of the day. -Both-of-these men left-behind-them-the memories of a life well spent and a career of accessful and faithful service which will remain as an incentive for those who follow in their footsteps.—The memory of Mr. Jones and Mr. Hedges will remain long after their bodies have been interred as even in these days of fleeting changes a community cannot readily forget such men.
