U. S. Needs Cut \$200,000,000; Balanced Budget a Certainty

(By Special Wire from Universal Service)
Washington, Oct. 27.—The Budget Bureau has slashed \$200,000,000 from the ordinary expense of the Federal government for the next fiscal year, Universal Service learns.
The new budget, which becomes effective July 1 for the 1934-1935 fiscal year, calls for expenditures of \$2,407,000,000. The present expenditures are approximately \$2,600,000,000. A balanced budget next year was believed certain by officials.

Washington, Oct. 27.—An unemployment relief grant of \$2,000,000 to New Jersey was announced today by Federal Relief Administrator Hopkins.

Paris, Oct. 27.—Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, who flew from Inverness, Scotland, for an unaided air station at Lakshurst, were last night in London, yesterday afternoon. The aviation field is about 20 miles from Paris. They motored to Paris and registered at the Hotel Clivon.

R. F. C. to Aid Gold Purchase

Washington, Oct. 27.—The Reconstruction Finance Corporation has authorized an issue of \$50,000,000 short term notes payable February 1, 1934, to finance President Roosevelt's gold-buying program to boost commodity prices through dollar control.
The issue followed a new boost in the price for newly-mined American gold to \$31.54 an ounce. This is 18 cents above the price paid Wednesday when the President's plan first swung into action. It is 51 cents higher than the London price.

Governor's Request Refused

Trenton, Oct. 27.—Acting Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt today informed Governor Moore that the Naval air station at Lakshurst will be used for training men on non-rigid aircraft. He said the Navy Department will not reconsider the Los Angeles as the Governor requested.

Princeton Seeks Funds

Princeton, Oct. 27.—Need of increased endowment for scholarship purposes and for a new library building is most pressing at the present time at Princeton university, according to the first annual report of President Dodds.

N. J. Institution Costs Drop

Trenton, Oct. 27.—The cost of maintaining in New Jersey institutions declined seven cents per person in the first three months of the present fiscal year, according to a report by Commissioner Ellis.

NRA Debates Ford Problem

Washington, Oct. 27.—The NRA today faced the decision whether it should "crack down" on Henry Ford, the most conspicuous NRA holdout.
Ford's refusal to sign the automobile code became a clear issue when it was learned his company was the low bidder for 1,000 trucks to be used by the Civilian Conservation Corp.
Decision will be left to the NRA whether Ford's compliance with the law will permit acceptance of his bid inasmuch as he refused to sign the automobile code and has not been allowed to fly the blue eagle.
