Red Cross Roll Call - The American Red Cross will have its an

nual nation-wide enrollment of members berinning tomorrow, Armistice Day, to Novemer 30, Thanksgiving Day. Within this period, the Rahway Chapter will extend an invitation to every adult in this city to join-

this great organization. Benefits of the Red Cross, both in this city and practically every community in the United States, as well as in foreign lands, have been realized more during the past-two years than ever before. This great humane organization which has aided the starving, brought relief to the suffering in flood and tornado-struck areas, extended its relief work into almost every hamlet and gave special aid to the unemployed during this period. The Red Cross in Rahway has been active

in many fields of endeavor and has done a tremendous amount of good for the sick and needy here. The annual report of the chapter published in this newspaper on Tuesday, clearly shows the work covered by the chapter, in its nursing activities, home service, first aid, chapter production, etc.

-The Rahway chapter during the past year employed three nurses who made 5,456 visits to homes of the sick here. The home service department aided 677 persons in various ways, while the production department made supplied 3,528 garments and 2,366 pairs c -stockings-for-the-relief committee. First aid was given in 463 accident cases and 108 persons instructed in first aid classes. In addition 1.500 bags of fibur and 3,000 yards of material for the needy here was obtained from the Federal goversment. Residents of Rahway cannot say the Red Cross locally has not been active or has shirked its duties.

The Rahway Red Cross Chapter showed its thoughtfulness for local residents two years ago when it dispensed with the annual canvass when it was found that the treasury had sufficient funds to pay its dues into the National association. This is typical of those handling the Red Cross work here.- This year it is necessary to call on local citizens for support. Because the Red Cross has proven its worth here, every citizen of Rahway should respond readily when the volunteer worke visit them within the next three weeks.






