





think of the problem sanely and fairly? Those persons who owe the \$845,000 have gone along and received the benefts of the city but have not stood their fair share of the expense. They have, in reality, been leaning on someone else; letting other persons donate to their upkeep. No self-respecting person will intentionally do a thing of this kind, yet hundreds of Rahway persons have been doing it. Does it not seem likely to assume that when the problem is looked at in that light that many will try to carry their portion of the load?






