With this in mind, let us turn to the prot lem of educating our adults, always a matter which the ever-progressive community must consider. Let-us-remember, too, that Rahway has 12 to 15 unemployed school teachers, persons who by reason of study andexperience, are qualified to teach, but be-cause of the necessity of reducing municipal expenses, are now without work. Then let us turn to the program of adult

education that is being carried on nationally under federal emergency-relief .- A total of \$60,000 is now coming into New Jersey for this work-and Rahway is not taking advantage of it.

Briefly, the plan is this. Local communities supply light, heat, janitor service, supplies and trained supervision, and the government pays the salaries of teachers t conduct evening classes in public schools for 30 weeks. Local unemployed teachers are hired for the work, each to receive \$15 per week for teaching four nights each week. gram; anything may be taught and as many classes may be formed as necessary. It is estimated that such a program in Rah-

way would cost \$1,500, which would give our unemployed teachers_some work and would give us much needed adult education. We're just wondering if we could not squeeze \$1,500 out of our relief money to carry on the problem here. Considering the benefit to be derived, is it not worthy of

We do not doubt but that most of our married women teachers are unusually qualified or they would not be holding their jobs loday when positions are at such a premium. It is only fair that the Board of Education seriously consider this matter. Then, IF the board members HONESTLY feel that a hardship is brought about by pouring two-persons' salaries into one home and leaving others without any, they should act at once to correct the matter. But this is a matter too far-reaching in its scope to criticize thout being properly informed

Are not these unemployed teachers as wellqualified to teach our children as are those married teachers who already have an in-

That question, which is heard every now and then, is well taken. But we must also ask what will be done with the marriedteacher who has given a large part of her life to the school. We must also consider what would be done about teachers' pensions if married teachers who have been teaching for a number of years are suddenly released. This problem does not only hold for teachers, but for every other line of business as We have few industrial organizations of any size which are not putting two salaries into single homes and leaving other homes

without any. It must be remembered, of course, that we cannot damn employment of married women just because they happen to be married. More power to them for tackling the task of ig homes and rearing children which often is the direct reason why they must add

Rahway high school students in one night's homework assignments has been revealed by 583 responses to Question Nine of the recent Journalism club questionnaire. This figure was calculated in the follow-ing hanner. An average of one-half hour is spent on an average of four major subjects by each of the 583 students, resulting in the total of 1,116 hours, or 48 days and 14 hours, or 50 minutes or 4 197 500 seconds

69.060 minutes, or 4,197,600 seconds. In a school week, 242 days and 22 hours. or

In a month of 21 school days these same students plow through 34 months or almost three years' time in studying. It is therefore assumed that during one school year, about 30 -years' total time is spent by the entire school body doing homework. If all the minutes spent bý students in solv-ing equations, memorizing irregular French

verbs, balancing chemistry equations, grinding out compositions, digesting geometry theorems, learning historical dates and remembering the Latin conjugations, the total aggregates 90 years, is is figured. Back of these statistics, the student may

now be enabled to march home, with the above_ facts in hand, and sternly demand of his parents why they are always scolding him because he doesn't do enough studying.
