I.School Commission Urges Savings In Janitorial Costs

Trenton. Dec. 22-The schools of New Jersey can ove at least \$2,000,000 through economies in plant operation, janitorial service and other costs, states a supplementary report made today to Governor Moore by the New Jersey School Survey Commission. The Commission, headed by Thomas N. McCarter, as chairman, has been conducting a survey under the direction of Dr. Paul F. Mort, director of the education. Teacher's college. Columbia uni

The costs of operating the physical school plant in New Jersey is aproximately \$9,000,000 of which \$5,000,000 is appropriated to janitorial, engineering employees, the commission reports. It points out that the total operation of the physical plants of the day schools is 10.5 percent of the current expenses while the **pay of janitorial employees** is 6.5 percent of current expenses. The report adds: "If present salary schedules are maintained and

school employs more janitors than the rather nended standards called for, there will iheral recomn te a saving of approximately \$1,450,000."

Lastly, the tree should be kept away from any fireplace. Care and caution will eliminate the "holiday falls." Under the heading of fun hazards are listed accidents caused by dangerous toys and unwise methods of celebrating.
