The three colored churches are coing as much among persons of the Negro race as are the churches for those of the Caucasian race. Is there any reason why these folk should

not be recognized? Is there a reason w they should not be given the same consideration as persons of the white race? But the fact that these colored persons are of the better type and are trying to find a means to provide a place where their activities can be centered is no reason that their work should be made a political question-a

question on which one party may guide public disfavor to another. The question of supplying a recreational center of some sort is being argued on both sides by persons of every religion, each political party and every walk of life; yet in it all is an unpleasant tang of prejudice and propa-

There are too many other problems facing the city today for one political party to grab onto such a thing as this and make of it a political issue. Problems such as the financial condition

of the city are important enough to comand all of the thought and energy of our counclimen without leaving time for one group of them to make the colored recreational center a political issue. Those private citizens who have taken u

the fight for the recreational center must be mmended for their work on a worthy cause. but they must always keep in mind all of the facts in the issue before making charges of any nature.

"Those colored folk in Rahway who are prominent in the argument must also remember always the work that has been done for them in the past, and then judge from that if those friends of the past are deserting them when needed most. "It is entirely unfair and untrue to charge

Council President Harry J. Nimzik of dodging this issue. Councilman-Nimzik. as much as any other councilman during his term of office, has been a friend and helper of the colored people in this city. He would have to have a sudden change of mind to fail them at this time. As chairman of the street committee las

year, Mr. Nimzik gave colored folk jobs and worked for them in legislative matters. He has on many occasions given them meals and money when they were in immediate need. To this writer, those facts do ot indicate that he would be opposed to the establishment of a recreational center.

When all the facts are considered it is at once apparent that there is no question but that the colored persons in this town should -have-a-recreational-center. With-this-agreed-upon, why-should therebe so much fuss about it? Why not name a committee of interested persons to study the matter; to determine how it would be financed, where it would be located, what type f government there would be and who would be responsible for the conduct of the affairs

of the center. Then, with these facts gathered, there would be an opportunity to intelligently consider the problem—and likely as not find the establishment of the center quite possible. In that way the matter would be taken out of the political muddle in which it has been placed. It would then be considered on its merits alone, and the councilmen would

be given an opportunity to spend their time on such large and all-inclusive matters as the financial situation of the city. **Five Points**


