

Relief Set-Up To Be Checked By Federal ERA Officials

Future Work And Program Will Be Formulated With Information Gathered In Survey; Local Office Not Informed Of Plans, Busch Says

Washington, Aug. 3.—An executive check up of the public relief situation and administration in the New Jersey state relief administration, according to an announcement made at Federal Relief Administration headquarters today, will be made by Federal ERA officials.

The information collected in the survey will be used to plan future work and relief programs in the local area. Its principal tasks will be to ascertain how many of those on local relief rolls are capable of being reemployed when business picks up, how many are hopelessly beyond rehabilitation and must receive some form of relief, and how many persons are on relief rolls without cause.

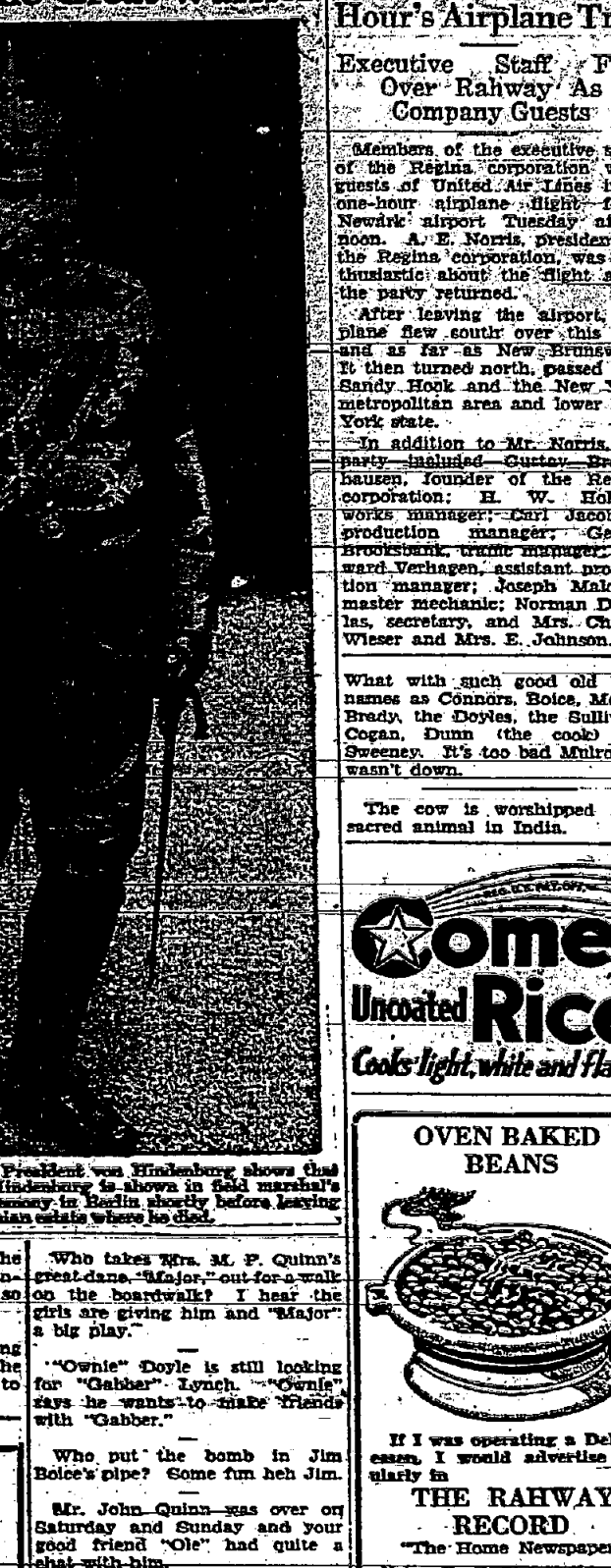
