cleaning and other liquids. That done, the citizen isn't nearly through. How about wiring and the lamp connections? Most of us, at one time or another, have done amateur work of this kind, and forgotten to have it replaced by an expert electrician. It would be a safe bet that there are thousands of switchboxes in which a penny is acting as a fuse, placed there "temporarily." One shortcircuit—and fire will result.

Finally, it is a rare attic which doesn't contain an accumulation of old clothes, old magazines, old furniture and old luggage-all ready to burn.

Look- your property over. And in the future make the same inspection at regular intervals. It will minimize the chance of fire—and that means safety to life, and money in your pocket.




