Railway 65 Years Ago
COMMON COUNCIL—Regular meeting, Tuesday evening, November 18, 1888. All members present except Gatchell. Minutes read and approved.

Communication from property owners on a part of Grand street, asking that that section of the street be graded, curbed, guttered and flagged—referred to committee on streets.

Communication from property owners, asking for gas lamp at Main and William streets—referred to lamp committee with power.

The following ordinances were passed:
To construct sewer in Bryant street and Hazelwood avenue; to regulate and otherwise improve Clinton street; to open west side of Railroad avenue.

Preliminary notices of opening Whittier and Stone streets were passed, and title taken to ordinances to correspond.

Three men, G. P. Lofgren, A. F. Taylor and W. P. Sheeler, of the local telephone division were present last night at a meeting in Harrison Avenue school, Roselle, of men of their company who helped build a remarkable record.
