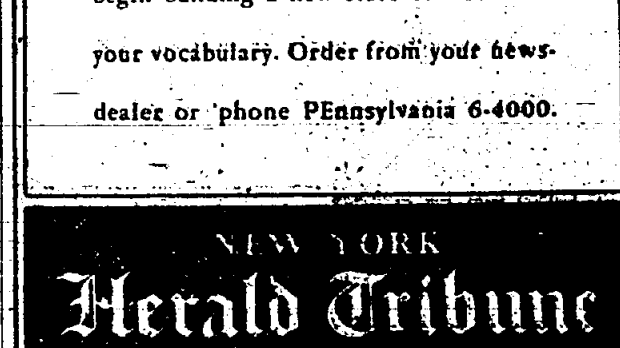

WARNING TO PROPERTY OWNERS

The Board of Water Commissioners wish to call attention to RULE 7 of the Rules and Regulations of the Water Department.

"The entire water supply will be shut off from any premises when it is discovered that a hose connection is being used for sprinkling without permission of the Board. There will be assessed in addition, a penalty of \$10.00 for the infringement of this rule, and a charge for the use of the hose connection for the entire time such connection shall have been installed."

It is the intention of the Board to see that this Rule is rigidly enforced and any person using a hose connection without the proper permit is warned to discontinue the use of same immediately or sign for a permit at the Office of the Water Department at the City Hall. The charge for a hose connection is \$4.00 per year payable quarterly.

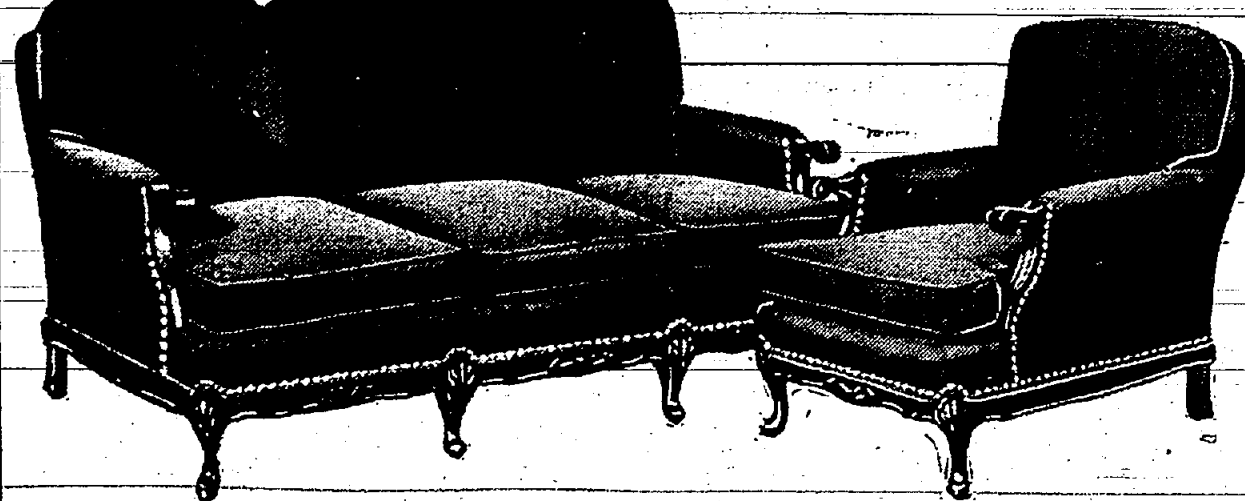

With the first day of Olympic competition scheduled for next Sabbath, the fans who are not too wrapped up in the big league flag races to consider other fields of sport are looking to Berlin, H. C. Salsinger, with the American contingent, writes a daily column for the Detroit News. In it he presents an interesting background for the athletic events.

Eddie Tolan of Detroit was the only contestant at the last Olympic Games who won two individual track events. He finished first in the 100 and 200 meters dashes. Becoming a double winner is more and more difficult with track and field events practiced in more than 50 countries. It was not so difficult when the Games were revived at Athens in 1896. The United States had three entrants at Athens who won two events each. James B. Connolly of Harvard won the hop, step and jump, was second in the high jump and third in the broad jump. Robert B. Garrett of Princeton won the 16-pound shot and discus events. Thomas E. Burke of Harvard won the 100 and 400 meters dashes. Elery H. Clark finished first in both the high jump and broad jump. Great Britain also had a double winner. E. H. Flack won the 600 and 1,500 meters runs. There were 12 track and field events on the program at Athens. The United States won nine and was second in three.

The first wreath winner in 1896 and the first athlete to wear the olive wreath since the discontinuance of the Games by the Roman Emperor Theodosius in 394 A. D. The Americans provided the main surprise of the revival. Connolly stroled into the arena and went down on one knee before he took his triple jump. The spectators believed that he was praying. But Connolly was merely tightening his shoelaces. Taking a deep breath he rushed down the take-off and landed fully 10 feet beyond his nearest competitor. He then pulled on his trousers and disappeared beneath the stadium. The Greeks were dumfounded.

A Prince Kicks
When Clark was ready for his broad jump he placed his sweater on the ground to mark the take-off and the Prince of Greece indignantly pronounced this an act of professionalism and kicked the sweater off the track. The Americans protested but the Prince had spoken and when a Prince spoke in those days there was nothing more to be said; his word was final. A long argument followed. The Prince refused to reverse his decision but he did finally compromise by holding his foot at the take-off and Clark won the broad jump easily. After Hoyt won the pole vault he had to jump two inches higher than his winning vault to satisfy the Prince that he did not win the event on a fluke.

How Times Change
It was the first and most conclusive victory that the United States ever scored in Olympic Games competition. Times have changed, figuratively and literally—Competition has become intense—Challenges are heard from all sections of the globe. Burke won the 100 meters dash in 1896 in 12 seconds flat and Tolan won at Los Angeles in 1932 in 10.3 seconds. There was no 200 meters event on the 1896 program. Burke also won the 400 meters sprint. His time was 54.15 seconds. William Arthur Carr won the Los Angeles 400 in 46.15 seconds. Clark won the 800 meters run at Athens in 2 minutes and 11 seconds and Thomas Hampson of England won at Los Angeles in 1 minute 49.8 seconds. Flack also won the 1,600 meters. His time was 4 minutes 39.15 seconds. Luigi Beccali of Italy captured the 1896 event in 3 minutes 51.2 seconds. Louie of Greece was the 1896 Marathon winner. His time, 2 hours 55 minutes and 20 seconds. Juan Carlos Zabala of the Argentine won the 1932 revival in 2 hours 31 minutes and 36 seconds.

Curtis of the United States won the 110 meters hurdles at Athens in 17.5 seconds. George J. Salting of the United States won the event at Los Angeles in 14.6 seconds. W. W. Hoyt of the United States cleared the bar at 10 feet 9 3/4 inches to win the pole vault event at Athens. William M. Miller of the United States won at Los Angeles by clearing 14 feet 1 3/4 inches. Clark leaped 6 feet 11 3/4 inches to win the high jump at Athens and Duncan McNaughton of Canada won at Los Angeles with a leap of 6 feet 5 3/4 inches. Clark's winning broad jump at Athens was 20 feet 8 3/4 inches. Edward L. Gordon of the United States took first at Los Angeles by jumping 25 feet 3/4 inches. Connolly was credited with 45 feet even in the hop, step and jump at Athens. Chas. Nambu of Japan totaled 61 and 6 feet 7 inches to gain first at Los Angeles. The United States won the shot put championship at Athens on Garrett's put of 36 feet 2 inches. The United States won again at Los Angeles when Leo Sexton tossed the 16-pound weight 52 feet 6 1/2 inches.

who went ahead, obtained the necessary data, and
proceeded in the correct manner. Now efforts are being
made to belittle his work, it seems.

If our officials will look back, they will recall a
number of editorials in The Record urging some action
on the police situation. We were no more successful
in getting action than was Mayor Barger despite the
fact that our plea was much stronger than his mere
suggestions. In fact, we were criticized by some officials
for demanding something they said could not be
done until later.

Judging from the last Council meeting when efforts
were begun to get some of the glory away from
Councilman Plunkett and hand it to Mayor Barger,
some of our officials wish they had heeded our advice
and Barger's.

If Mayor Barger had been really interested in his
proposal, why didn't he push action on it instead of
waiting nearly five months before one of his political
colleagues went to bat for him? His suggestions were
evidently not strong enough to warrant consideration
by the police committee. At least, they weren't given
much consideration and we doubt if anything would
ever have been said about the Barger suggestions if
Councilman Plunkett hadn't started his plan.

What difference does it make who sponsors civil
service? Surely, Mr. Plunkett doesn't care. He is more
concerned with something for the good of the city
and has said so. We believe Mayor Barger feels the
same way. Then why have the police committee waste
its time and consider something which is already under
way and which will proceed in the correct manner
regardless of what the police committee does?

Why use the time of public officials in an apparent
attempt to gain glory for a political candidate when
there are important matters to be considered? All
