Miss Shotwell's Passing Ends Many Years Of Service

A career marked by many years of service to others came to an end Friday with the death of Miss Anne Shotwell, member of a family whose name is interwoven with the history of Rahway from the time of the city's founding.

Any expressions here will be mere words and cannot pay adequate tribute to this sterling woman. Throughout her long life, Miss Shotwell lived solely to serve others. Her work in behalf of others, particularly children and the poverty stricken, was so great that it can never be evaluated.

She was not given to boasting about her achievements. She saw no reason for being made the object of praise because, to her, service of others was the sole object of her life. If ever a person lived the betterment of others, it was Miss Anne Shotwell. She may fittingly be classed as Rahway's Florence Nightingale.

Her long life was filled with actions of kindness to others and she gave of her own funds and resources that others might have their burdens eased. She lived a full life crammed with humanitarian deeds.

While she shunned the public eye, her work did not pass unnoticed. Everybody in Rahway either knew her or knew of her and held her in high regard. She was a woman whose name will always be linked with the great work of this city.

Taxes Eat Up Share Of All Income

"A housewife attempting to make both ends meet from her husband's \$20-a-week pay check must disburse \$5 out of that \$20—one fourth of it—for taxes—direct and indirect—seen and unseen," says a recent survey.

This will probably come as a shock to persons in the small-income bracket—many of whom are laboring under the delusion that they are entirely tax-free, because they pay nothing in direct taxes—but the figures are irrefutable. American corporations pay taxes of more than \$2,000,000,000 a year, in addition to corporate income taxes, which totaled nearly \$500,000,000 in 1933. Wholesalers and retailers of goods are also heavily taxed. And every cent of that tremendous tax bill is, in effect, simply "paid on account" for individuals by the manufacturers and others.

In other words, business pays the bill to government—and then business passes it on to the people by adding to the cost of every commodity and service it sells. Business couldn't do it if it wanted to. It can't raise money out of thin air, or pull greenbacks out of a magician's hat. Every cost of operation—whether it be rent, supplies, wages or taxes—must come out of the pockets of people who buy its products. When you buy a loaf of bread or an automobile, or go to a movie or pay your rent, drink a glass of beer or ride on a street car, part of the money you spend goes to reimburse the enterprise involved for the taxes it has paid government on your account. And the higher the taxes soar, the more you must pay. You can't beat the bill you "owe" the government.

So if you're fallen for the ancient fallacy to the effect that "The rich pay all the taxes, and the poor get all the benefits of government free," think again!

Here we have some of the most progressive industrial concerns in New Jersey and they fail to take advantage of the great amount of free advertising that is theirs for the asking. During the summer months, you can see cars bearing license plates from almost every state in the Union parked in our city streets or passing through on the two great highways that border the town. These motor tourists are out to see things. They want to return to their homes with tales of places they have been and the wonders they have viewed—and they are not interested in

scenery alone. They like to visit industrial plants; plants like Merck, or Wheatona, or Regina or any of the other places that have an interesting story to tell if the right person does the telling.

A Chamber of Commerce would do the trick and the cost would be a mere trifle in comparison with benefits that proper management would attain. Our police officers could be furnished with booklets giving an outline of Rahway's historical background and extending an invitation to visit the various places of interest in the city. These could be handed out to visitors from other parts of the country and Rahway soon would become known as an industrial city.

I'll even throw in a few suggestions, just to start things rolling. How is this for a Wheatona blurb? "Come, have breakfast with us." Or perhaps you might like this one better: "After your journey, clean up with Regina." And for Merck, I would suggest: "Your ills are our business." But seriously speaking, don't you think that we should have a Chamber of Commerce. I do and I'll have more to say about it in some future column—that is unless the boss decides that perhaps I'd do better if I wrote less.
