The only comment which can be made at this time is that it is a good sign that people are interested in their government sufficiently to make themselves acquainted with the various forms of government existing elsewhere.

is still a member of the force may be the reward for his silence.

Meade does not state whether the "political domination" was city, county or state. This is similar to the charges of public office who are trying to serve the taxpayers to the best of their ability. To the careful investigator, such a broad accusation might be considered unworthy of mention.

Withholding Information

The fact that the charges of "political domination" still remain unproven in this case adds weight to the indictment. Even the most casual observer would be justified in forming the opinion that the investigator, for some remote reason, may be withholding information gleaned during his survey.

Strangely enough, none of those in power at the time certain conditions mentioned in the report occurred has issued a public state-

ment denying the charges of "political domination."

The report up to this point contains little of a constructive nature. It does disclose, in a vague form, much of the inner workings of the police department. Its true worth, will be judged by the final action taken in making disposition of the entire affair.

Albans Nest Victim

McIntyre's part in the functioning of the department may be considered by many as being settled. He has been reduced in rank, but he still remains a member of the force. Captain Albans appears to be the next victim selected to be sacrificed on the altar of "political domina-tion."

He already has had a taste of standing trial before jury. The fact that the case against him was so weak that the jury last listed in bringing in a verdict of not guilty, may not deter those who are out to get his scalp.

Some Humans Make Dogs More Desirable
Reading the daily press, one cannot help but be impressed by the stories of the war between capital and labor, in their waste and barbarism. For the moment the Spanish civil war is a case in point. If the government wins, Spain will be subjected to an iron-handed communist dictatorship. If the rebels are victorious, a Fascist military dictatorship will be established, according to rebel leaders, and all newspapers except Fascist organs will be suppressed, and all civil liberties will be abrogated.

Thus the old story is repeated—the common people will be the losers. No matter how the war turns out, constitutional government and freedom in Spain will end. Leaders of the world over are mad for power, as press dispatches from leading nations indicate. With such examples to go by, we are threatened with a labor "war" between workers and employers in our own United States. If it comes, both sides will lose no matter who seems to "win". Lost wages, lost opportunities, lost good will and lost morale are never returned. When humans sidetrack intelligence for tactics of barbarism, the world loses.

Yet, with horrible examples of the folly of blind strife all around us, extremists in our country, on both sides of the labor question, are fanning the labor war flames. Their aim is to lead a group of dogs circling around for a change to fly at each other's throats. There is some excuse for the dogs. There is no excuse for the humans today who have every facility at their command for investigating, arbitrating, legislating and settling their controversies in an orderly and intelligent manner.

That old quotation, "The more I see of humans, the better I like dogs," becomes more impressive every day.

Having in mind some complimentary utterances made recently by educators and other critics who should know, causes me to doubt the efficiency of our present school system. No less an authority than Dr. Leon Neulen, president of the State Teachers' Association, says that in education, New Jersey ranks "sixth from the bottom." Not a very flattering statement when you stop to think of the low educational standards of some of our southern states where schooling amounts to little more than learning to read and write.

Dr. Neulen appears to place the bulk of the blame on the shoulders of our representatives in Trenton. He claims that "the state program to equalize educational opportunities in all communities has broken down," and adds that "the parent-teacher organizations should demand that the legislators support what the state Constitution guarantees." If I could be sure that lack of funds is the sole cause of New Jersey's pitiable plight, I would be inclined to agree with Dr. Neulen.

However, as one who has spent a goodly portion of his life delving into the affairs of others through the guise of journalism, I cannot say that I am thoroughly in accord with the present system of streamlined schoolship. In the course of my observations I have found that many teachers use the "guinea-pig process" in their work. Classrooms have been turned into clinics and the child who does not react to the whims of the teacher is considered somewhat of an intellectual invalid.

The old time "school marm" did not try to psychoanalyze her pupils. In fact, I seriously doubt that she even knew the meaning of the word. But she got results and after all that is what counts. Many of our modern teaching methods are purely experimental. If the experiments are successful, then the future should yield a splendid crop of Edisons and Einsteins, but if it fails—well, you and I are not wearers of the golden gown of genius.

It might be well if our educators restrained themselves from going too far into the realm of theory. A lot of the "ideas" that have cropped up in recent years and have been applied to the training of youth were old when the ancients were young. In dealing with youngsters, we are dealing with human nature in the raw. Certain traits and characteristics may be altered to conform with convention, but only the Creator can build anew. All men are not made in the same mold, but the average run of the mill is not far removed from the basic pattern. There may be something to that "little, old, red schoolhouse" stuff after all.
