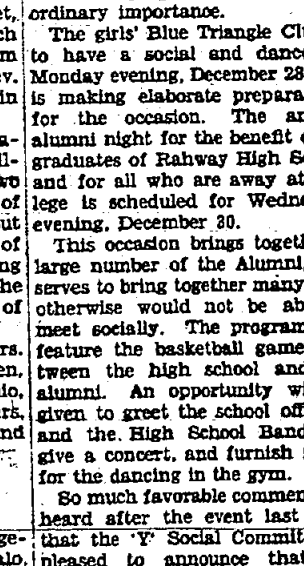
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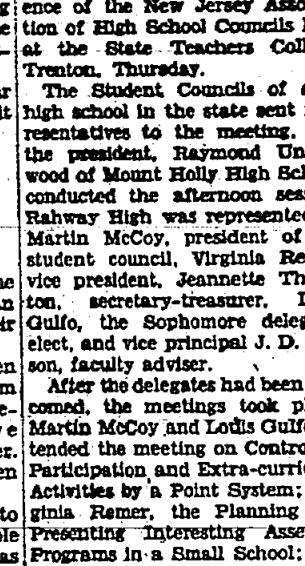
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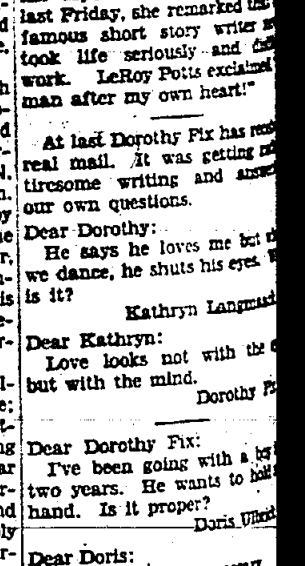
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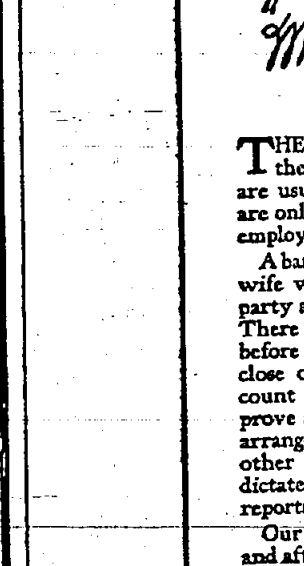
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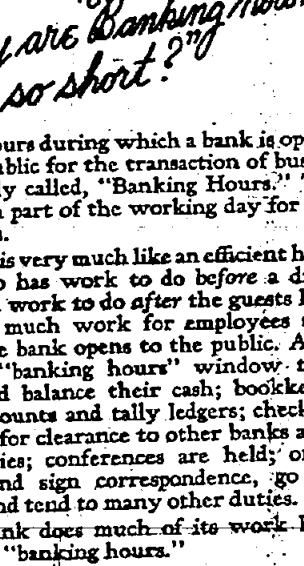
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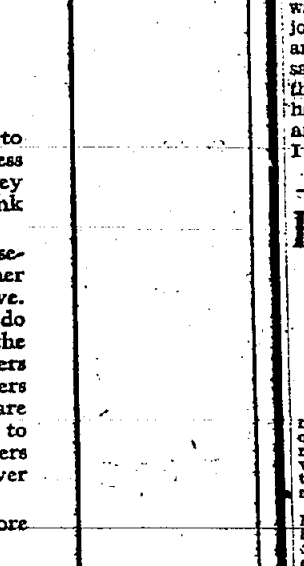
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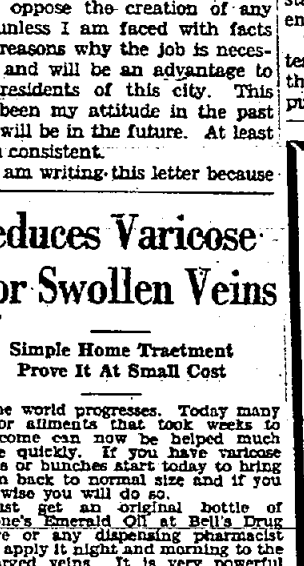
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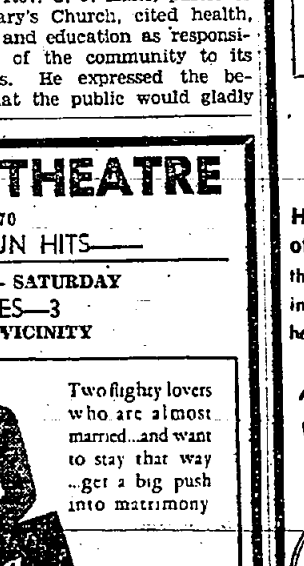
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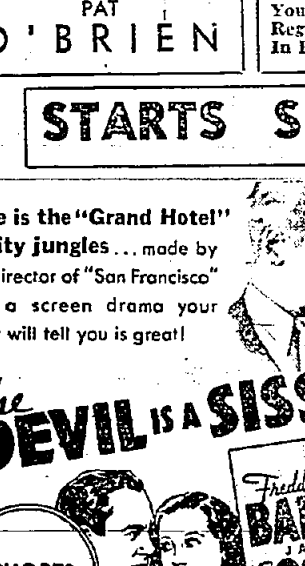
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Coach Walter Looks For Most Aggressive School Basket Team In History

Newspapers, as part of their regular tasks, make numerous suggestions which they believe will better conditions in the territory which they serve. We made one in this column on Friday the 13th of November and shortly afterward the Athletic Council, which mans the affairs of high school athletic teams, had adopted our suggestion that the school football schedule be lightened. We were told about it in confidence and therefore did not publish the announcement before the end of the football season. The result is that Thomas Jefferson and Cranford were not represented on the local football schedule after this year. Those in charge of athletics did not tell the team members about the change until just before the Jefferson game and perhaps that is why the club looked so well for most of the contest even in defeat. The boys gave it all they had but it wasn't enough to overcome the power packed by that big Jefferson team. It is a relief to the coaches and parents to know that their boys will no longer have to risk their necks against the big Jefferson and tough Cranford teams. More than one of them held their breath as they watched boys like Jumbo Czerwinski hurl his 220 pounds at some of the light Railway 140 pounders in the Thanksgiving Day game.

Members of the Athletic Council are to be congratulated for their action in lightening the grid schedule. They expect to have some trouble picking up two opponents but have already begun negotiations for replacements. Since Linden, suggested by us for the annual holiday game, is tied up with Union for the present, it will be necessary to bring in another team but if Linden and Union ever make the change in their game date, Railway has been assured that Linden will take the holiday date. At present it appears that Metuchen will be the holiday opponent although negotiations are not complete at this time.

Railway and Jefferson have met eight times since Batin hit us and Jefferson created. In those eight games Railway won two, Jefferson four and two were tied. The Jeffs have won their four victories in a row, indicating clearly that Railway can no longer compete with the school which is growing each year and is now a big school with a bigger team. As Batin, the Elizabeth school always had a prominent place on the Railway schedule and in those days the teams were more evenly matched. Cranford has been a regular foe for the past five years and now ranks as one of the best Group 2 schools in the state. While smaller than Railway, the Blue and White team has always been more powerful.

Athletic Council members, in severing football relations, point out that they have no feeling against Jefferson and Union ever making the change in their game date, Railway was made solely by Jeffs Railway teams the opportunity to meet opposition more in their class. They will still grace the local basketball schedule. In addition to Metuchen, other possibilities being considered are North Plainfield, Scotch Plains, Madison and a number of schools. The officials hope to get two new opponents from this list.

The lightening of the schedule will make things fairer for the boys and the coaches. Prospects are better for next year but are still far from bright. Every boy in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades has been playing football this season, another recommended project, but these fellows won't be coming to the varsity for several seasons yet. When they do they will be better equipped to play varsity football than any newcomers in past years. From the team which wound up the season last week, Coaches George Kramer and Ray Drake will lose only six boys who contributed anything to the team. These are Dave Gage and Jim Henry in the backfield, Mike Giaglia, Ray Beebe, Wined Mundy and Bernie Coventry in the line. The other member of the squad who is not returning is Don Newman but the coaches won't miss him as his play was not of sufficient value to warrant his being kept on the squad late in the season.

Boys returning with more experience are Charley Shupper, Ted Burke and Warren Brown, end; John Kobersky and Ed Johnson, tackles; Harold Drexler and Dave Martin, guards and Homer Enon, center. In the backfield, those coming back are Hans Jenkins, George Kierl, Frank Bidder, Eddie Schaefer and Bob Taylor. There are other squad members such as Watson Masco and Barney Bidde who will be back and should be of some value. Just who will come up from the freshman and second teams is a matter of conjecture although judging from the records of these clubs, there will be no super abundance of material. However, it is interesting to note that the Athletic Council is following our suggestion, has done its bit to make the situation even better.
