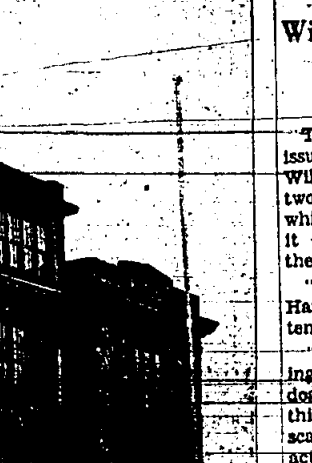

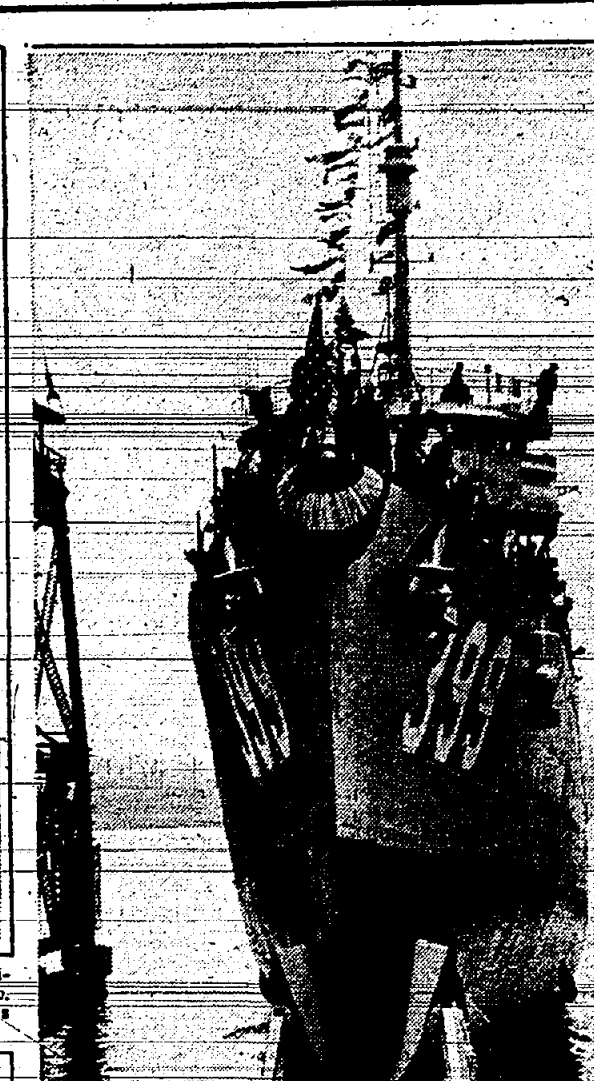

DECISION DUE SOON ON NEW RAHWAY HIGH SCHOOL

Within another two weeks, Rahway will decide whether to appropriate \$400,000 as the city's share of the cost of the proposed \$764,000 high school building.

Before this decision is made by Common Council September 14, the public will be given another opportunity to be heard upon the question when a public meeting is held next Wednesday evening at 8 P. M. in the high school auditorium.

Although two public meetings have already been held on the subject and the public has indicated its approval of plans for the new structure, another session has been ordered. Since the public will pay for the school, it is only right that the opportunities to be heard shall be presented to those who will pay the bill.

There is no doubt that Rahway needs a new high school. Neither is there any doubt that the cost will not be an easy one for the taxpayers of Rahway to bear. This year the number of tax appeals filed by dissatisfied taxpayers reached 61, the greatest number filed here in 10 years. This is a clear indication that the public is far from pleased with its tax bills.

However, the majority of Rahway taxpayers realize that the city cannot progress without a new high school. The present structure, built in 1909, has long ago become outmoded. Older students will argue, "Why spend all this money for a fancy building? We went to the little red school house and the same should be good enough for the youngsters today."

But times have changed and the little red school house is as much out of date today as the horse and buggy. If we are going to have a new school, we must have a modern one, complete in every detail. A makeshift educational plant will solve the school problem only for a few years and then we will have to consider school extension all over again.

The present high school situation does not reflect a pleasant picture. Only three high school classes are now attending the Campbell street building and this "student body" has to meet in six other buildings in addition to the main high school structure. Sanitary facilities in the old buildings are deplorable. "The structure cannot be kept clean. It is crowded, poorly ventilated and the lighting has long since outlived its usefulness."

It has been proven that this inadequate school is one reason why so many Rahway youngsters have moved out of the city. The more fortunate parents who want to live here have sent their children to private schools.

We are firm in our belief that Rahway needs a new school and if we are to have one, we should have the best because it will have to fill our needs for years to come. WATCH THE SCHOOLS FOR COMMUNIST TEACHINGS

A call to Americans to be on their guard against "revolutionary propaganda" from Communists was made in Boston recently by Senator Walsh of Massachusetts, one of the Democratic leaders of the Senate.

The Senator warned that Communists were working particularly within the schools of the nation. If this is so, and the head of the Communist Party recently admitted it, then it is the duty of every parent to inspect closely material of a radical nature which is infiltrated ever so skillfully into the public school system.

There are three types of Communists that must be watched, the Senator said—first, "a group of keen-minded college graduates and university professors—the most dangerous, for their philosophy is destroying the sanity of countless students; second, 'the numerically insignificant but vocally strenuous' active party members, and third, the 'commonplace' between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000, borderline Communists."

Not only in schools is this propaganda being directed, the Senator said, "but it is carried into colleges, labor societies, civic and fraternal units, business martyr centers, and, sad to relate, some religious bodies as well."

Senator Walsh has served in Congress for years. As chairman of the important Senate Committee on Labor and Education he has been in a position to know whereof he speaks. He words, therefore, are more than idle comment. They become a significant message of warning to Americans who believe in America.

Rahway 15 Years Ago

Infant mortality statistics made public by the American Child Health Association shows that Rahway stands seventh in a list of 30 New Jersey cities for the year 1922.

One of the most delightful social functions of the summer season in this city was a surprise party given Saturday night in honor of Miss Ella Snedden of Barnet Street.

Frederick William H. Randolph, who is spending the summer at the shore, came up yesterday to file his petition for nomination at the September primary.

When the public schools open for the 1923-24 session next Wednesday it is expected that the enrollment will greatly exceed the record mark of 2,399 reached last year, according to Superintendent W. F. Little.

Another argument being advanced by proponents of the new school is that unless Rahway maintains accepted state standards, the school will lose its accredited standing. This would mean that high school graduates would have difficulty getting into colleges and that the city would lose its state apportionment of funds.

The proposed school site is being discussed freely. In the selection of a site at the end of Central avenue, the Board of Education is being criticized because the location is so far from the center of the city. Regardless of where the school is located, there will be complaints. We know that the Board of Education, in temporarily selecting this site, has done so solely because there is no other site which would be acceptable without incurring great expense and destroying valuable real estate.

While the official decision regarding the school won't be made until September 14, next Wednesday's public meeting will undoubtedly result in a decision whether or not the school shall be built. Once again, we urge Rahway residents to attend this meeting.

Questions will be answered and information will be provided. This question is not one for the property owners alone to decide. Renters will share the cost along with the owners and any tenant who thinks the school won't cost him a cent will find himself badly fooled.

We feel that Rahway has waited long enough for a decent high school. The problem is one of the most vital faced here in years and unless the school is built now, we can't see how the city can continue to be classed as a progressive municipality.

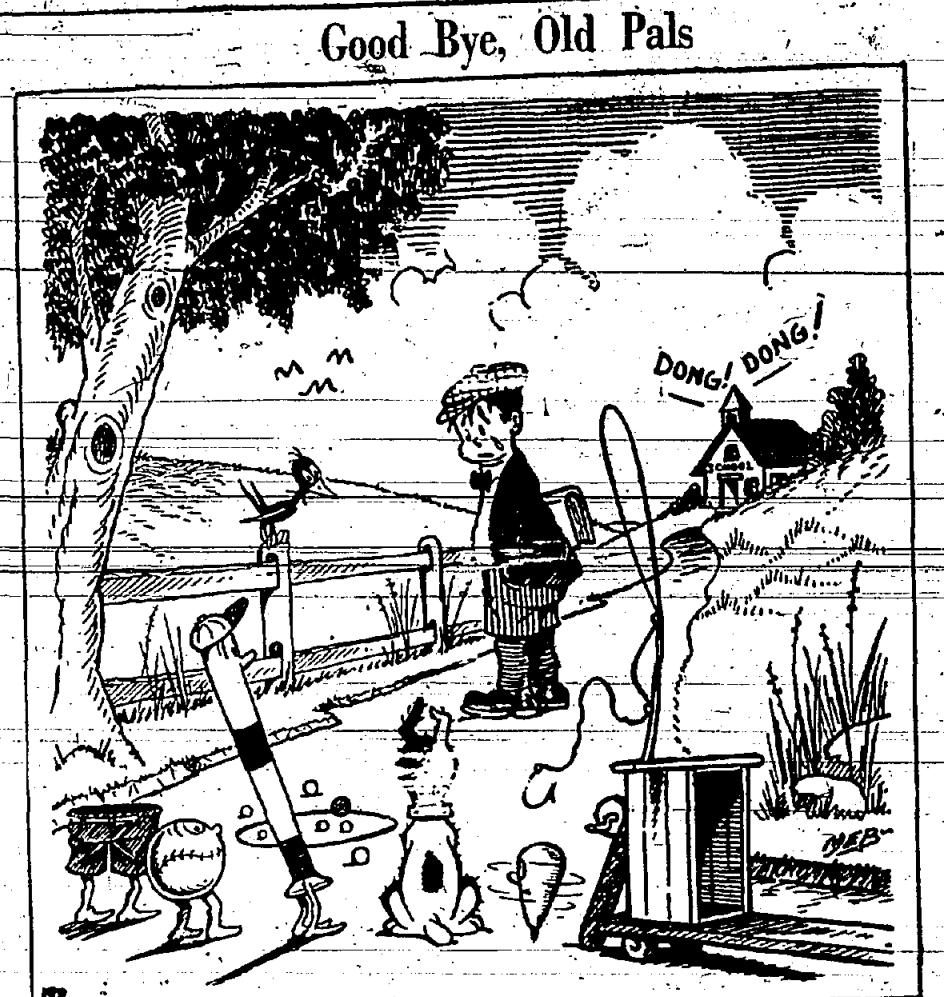
