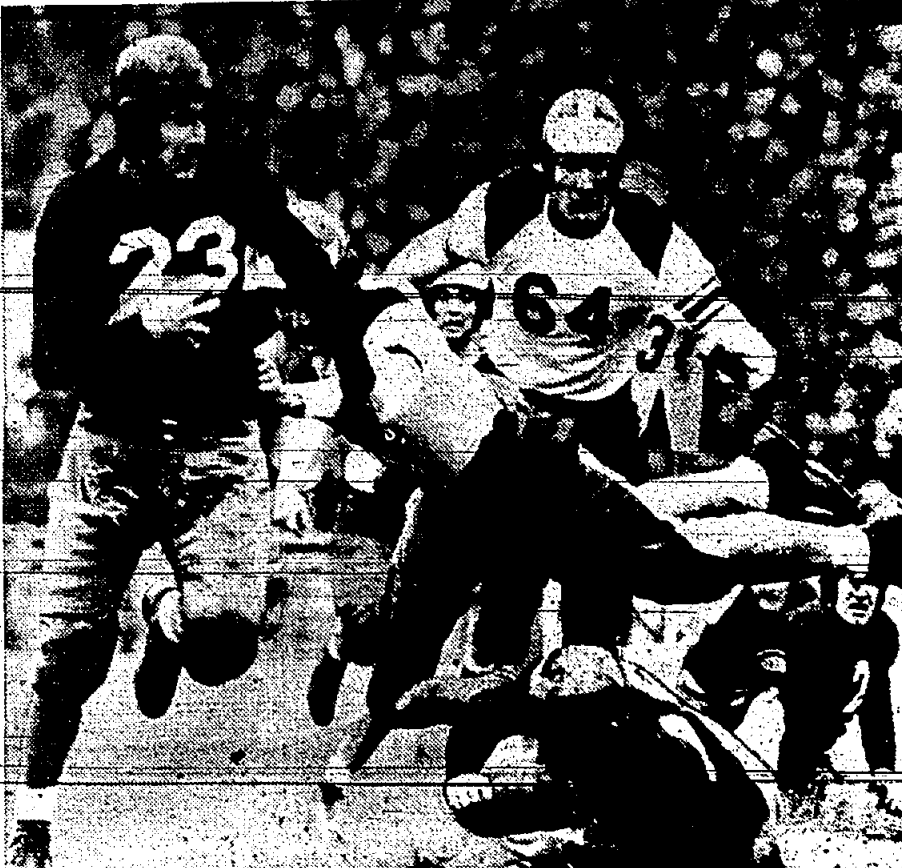

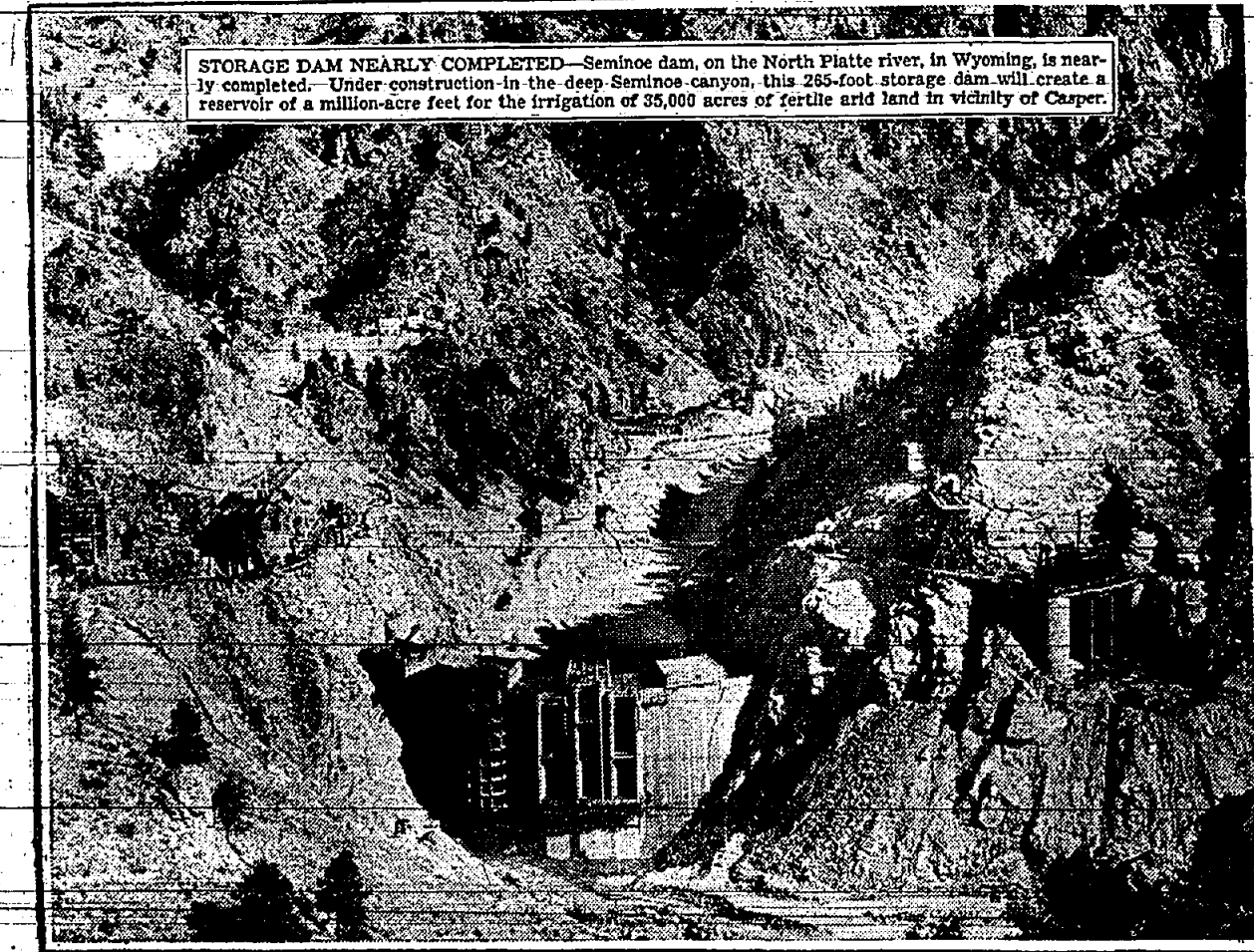

When petition filing time came around, the Democratic bigwigs let it be known that John was going to run but that they were trying to get him to make the run again. He finally accepted just before the deadline for filing petitions. A question which is still unanswered is "Did Jim Kinnely and his colleagues get John to promise to run with the understanding that he could resign after re-election?"

Kinnely, who got his present well-paid position from Barger, naturally wanted his friend to run again because it means a lot to Jim to keep the Democrats in power. In fact, if the Democrats don't stay in power, Jim will have to go back to that office job unless he's putting away a nest egg for the rainy day which is sure to catch up with his party some of these days. Barger had been successful twice in local elections and was evidently the reasoning of the strategists. The party would have more chance of winning with John heading the ticket and if he didn't want to serve, he could resign after his re-election and Kinnely could tell council who he wanted in his place.

Two years ago he wouldn't have turned down the tax receiver's or city treasurer's job but he didn't have a look in. Mark Gettings, although he was assured of the postmaster's job long before the police trial, quit before the term was up but he at least had the courtesy to wait until this important task was over. Then Sam Morton was elected to the post of Councilman-at-large but on the eve of installation day, was lined up for the city clerk's post.

Folks don't blame any of these three men for quitting to take a paying job. I would rather be postmaster, city clerk or work on the WPA for money than warm a Council seat and get a kick in the pants for my troubles. But the irritable part of the whole matter is that this thing of running for an elective job and then running out on it is getting to be a habit. In every case

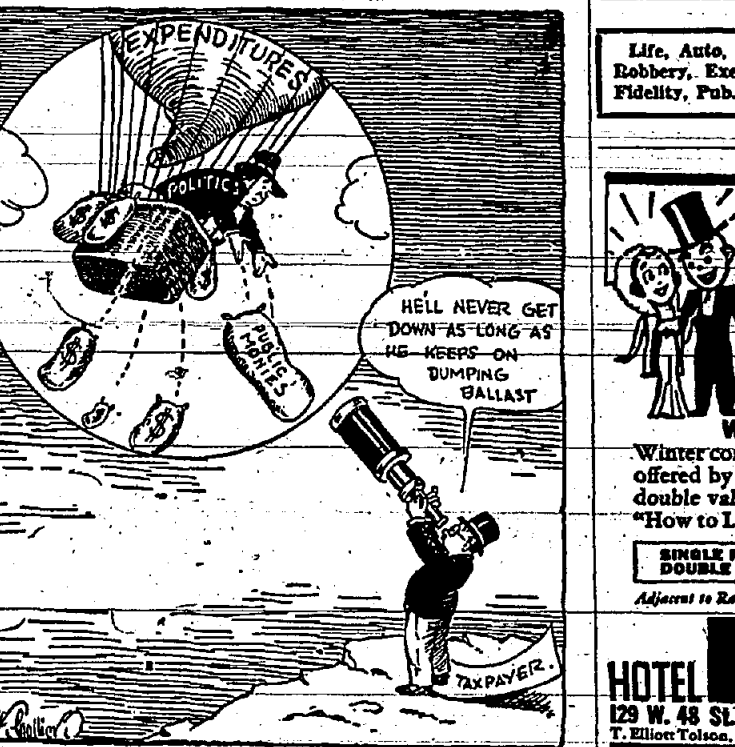
where an elective official resigned to chew on a political plum, the majority party elected his successor. Maybe the folks didn't want Jim Patten to fill the post Sam Morton gave up but just the same, the Democrats in Council named him.

In this country, the majority still rules and folks vote for the men they want to represent them. They don't like the idea of having a political party give them their candidates without asking them a thing about it. The stage is all set for another runout which will occur if Barger is re-elected and Jim Patten becomes mayor until the next election. Under these circumstances, a vote for Barger would in reality be a vote for Patten. Fred, like Jim Kinnely, could use a job, they said.

Fred, Sr., won and Fred, Jr., got the job. His term won't expire until the end of next year but if Papp is on the Council he will have a chance of getting re-appointed. I don't blame Papp. If I had a son who was an engineer, I would try to get him the city job, too. If I were a politician. At the top of this column we started out to say that Carl Jacobson was a good sharpshooter. He thinks like the rest of us who have done a lot of thinking trying to figure out the fog which hangs around the leader of the Democratic ticket. And unless the fog is lifted mighty soon, I know a lot of folks who are going to pull the Republican levers on the machines November 8. We'll be justified, too.
